ADMISSIONS AND EXAMINATIONS LEADING TO THE AWARD OF THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF ARTS (CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM) (THREE YEAR DEGREE COURSE) DIRECTION, 2022.

Whereas, Maharashtra Public Universities Act, 2016 (VI of 2017) (hereinafter the Act) has come into force from 1st March 2017;

AND

Whereas, the University has issued Direction No.15 of 2017 dealing with the composition of the four faculties created by the Act, where under the existing different faculties of the University have been merged into the four new faculties created by the Act, by which the erstwhile independent faculties of "Arts" and "Social Sciences" have been merged in the new faculty of "Humanities" under the Act;

AND

Whereas, the University Grants Commission, New Delhi vide letter No.D.O.No.F-1-2/2008 (XI Plan) dated 31stJanuary 2008 regarding new initiatives under the XI Plan-Academic Reforms in the University has suggested for improving quality of higher education and to initiate the Academic Reforms at the earliest,

AND

Whereas, the Special Task Committees under the erstwhile faculties of Arts and Social Sciences in their meetings held during 02nd March 2016 to 16th May 2016, prepared the syllabi and scheme of examination for the Bachelor of Arts, Semester Pattern (Three Year Degree Course) in the erstwhile Faculties of Arts and Social Science and recommended to the Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor for starting the said course from the academic session 2016-17;

AND

Whereas, the Hon'ble Vice Chancellor of Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur in exercise of his powers under 14(7) of the Maharashtra University Act, 1994 (since repealed by the Act VI of 2017) had considered, accepted and recommended to the Academic Council, on behalf of the Board of Studies under the Faculties of Arts and Social Science, the policy decision regarding introduction of Bachelor of Arts, Semester Pattern

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, course, it's syllabi along with the draft Direction and the scheme of examination for semesters-I to VI;

AND

Whereas, the Academic Council in its meeting held on 08th June, 2016 vide item No. 1(B) & 4 (B) has considered, accepted and recommended to Management Council, the syllabus for the for Bachelor of Arts (Three Year Degree Course) in the Faculty of Arts & Social Science, (Semester Pattern) with draft direction and the Scheme of examination of Semester-I to VI;

AND

Whereas, the Management Council in its meeting held on 14th June, 2016 vide item No. 96 (B)& 99(B), had considered and accepted the course of Bachelor of Arts, (semester pattern) (Three Years Degree Course) in the erstwhile Faculties of Arts & Social Science, with draft Direction and scheme of examination of Semester-I to VI;

AND

Whereas, Direction No. 12 of 2016, introducing the semester pattern Bachelor of Arts (Three Year Degree Course) from the Academic Session 2016-17 had been issued by the University;

AND

Whereas, the University had issued Direction No. 13 of 2017 prescribing "conditions for conduct of undergraduate and post graduate examinations based on credit based/choice based credit system, in all faculties, Direction, 2017" on 06/06/2017, prescribing certain conditions relating to maximum and minimum passing marks in the theory /practical subjects prescribed in the semester of a course, the maximum theory and practical subjects in a semester, rules of exemption and ATKT, and also the coding pattern for the subjects in each semester of the course;

AND

Whereas, provision for Additional B.A. on the lines prescribed in Ordinance No. 146/1997, since repealed, had been provided vide the decision of the Vice-Chancellor taken under section 12(7) of the Act, on behalf of the faculty of Humanities, on 05-01-2019 and the same were incorporated in the Direction no. 04 of 2019;

AND

Whereas, in the meeting of Board of Deans held on 19.7.2021 certain recommendations were made regarding regrouping of subjects to be opted by the students, Credit allocation and conduct of examination for the B.A. Program, the said recommendations were accepted in the Faculty meetings held on 3rd and 7th August 2021 and the Academic Council in its meeting held on 9th August 2021 approving the said changes recommended the same to the Management Council for its acceptance which were considered and approved by the Management council in its meeting dated 13th August 2021.

AND

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Whereas, in order to give effect to the provisions of New National Education Policy certain changes in the scheme of examination were accepted and recommended by the Board of Studies in various subjects of Arts/Humanities in their meetings dated 30.8.2022

AND

Whereas, the meetings of Faculty of Humanities and Academic Council are not scheduled in near future and there was exigency to implement the new scheme of examination from the Academic Year 2022-23 for Bachelor of Arts and therefore the scheme of examination was accepted by Vice Chancellor exercising the powers conferred under section 12(7) of the Act;

AND

Whereas, Direction No. 28 of 2021- replacing Direction No. 11 of 2020 was issued by the University but the same has lapsed by virtue of the provision of proviso to section 12(8) of the Act necessitating the issuance of a fresh Direction, incorporating the provisions of the lapsed Direction with changes necessitated by the decisions of various authorities referred above;

Now, therefore, I, Dr. Subhash R. Chaudhari, in exercise of my powers under section 12(8) of the Act, do hereby issue the following Direction;

- 1. This Direction may be called "Admissions and Examinations leading to the award of the Degree of Bachelor of Arts (Choice Based Credit System) (Three Year Degree Course) Direction, 2022"
- 2. This Direction shall come into force from the date of its issuance.
- 3. The duration of the B.A. course shall be of three academic years consisting of six semesters with the University examinations at the end of each semester namely:
 - a) B.A. Semester I Exam
 - b) B.A. Semester II Exam
 - c) B.A. Semester III Exam
 - d) B.A. Semester IV Exam
 - e) B.A. Semester V Exam
 - f) B.A. Semester VI Exam
- 4. The theory examinations of semesters-I, III, and V shall be conducted by the respective colleges where the students have been formally admitted for pursuing the studies in respect of the program govern by this Direction and the theory examinations for semesters II IV and VI and also the practical examinations, wherever prescribed, irrespective of the semesters, shall be conducted by the University at the places and according to the Time table notified by the University. The regular examinations for the odd semesters shall be conducted in Winter and the regular examinations for the even semesters shall be conducted in the Summer. The modality and details of semester I, III

and V examinations to be conducted by the Colleges shall be notified

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separately by the University.

5. ELIGIBILITY TO THE COURSE:

In order to be eligible for admission to the 1st semester of Bachelor of Arts, Semester Pattern (Three Year Degree) course, the applicant should have passed the 12th standard examination of the Maharashtra State Board of Secondary and Higher Secondary Education in the Faculty of Arts or Faculty of Commerce or Faculty of Science, Vocational Stream, Professional Courses or any other 10+2 examination with English as one of the compulsory subject. Where, however, the applicant has passed the 12th standard examination without English as the compulsory paper such applicant shall have to obtain the eligibility certificate from the University.

6. ELIGIBILITY FOR ADMISSION IN EXAMINATION:-

Subject to compliance with the provisions of this Direction and of other ordinances in force from time to time, the following persons shall be eligible for admission to the examination:-

- (a) A student who has prosecuted a regular course of study for not less than six months prior to that examination;
- (b) A teacher in an educational institution eligible under the provisions of Ordinance No. 18;
- (c) An external student.

Provided that in the case of the candidates eligible under clause (a) and (b) above the candidate shall have attended a course of laboratory instructions by obtaining casual admission in a college for the subject in which laboratory work is prescribed. Such a candidate shall submit a certificate to that effect signed by the Principal of the college.

- (d) For external candidate the internal mark of a subject/paper shall be awarded in proportion to the marks secured by him/her in the University examination in the theory or practical subject/paper.
- 7. **ATKT Rules:-** Only the students who have taken admission as regular students are eligible for the benefits of the ATKT rules hereunder. Thus the external students and the students appearing in examinations under para 6 (b) above and para 21 hereinafter are not eligible for the benefit of the ATKT rules.

The ATKT rules for admission in higher semesters of the B.A. (Choice Based Credit System) course shall be as given in following table:

- 8) a) Without prejudice to other provisions of Ordinance no. 6 relating to the examination in general, provisions of Para 5, 8, 10 and 31 of the said ordinance shall apply to every student admitted to this course.
 - b) The students admitted to this Degree Course shall be governed by the general Ordinances/ Directions of the University which are applicable to all the regular, external and ex-students. These ordinances include complete as well as relevant provision of Ordinance No. 1, 2, 6, 7-A, 9, 10, 19, 109, ordinance No. 30 of 2006, (Amended Ordinance No. 4 of 2006), Direction 9 of 2008, Direction 5 of 2004, wherever applicable.

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- 9) The fee for the course including the tuition, examination, laboratory and other fees shall be as prescribed by the university from time to time.

Note: The coding of the subjects in the semester II onward shall be on the lines of the coding in the first semester. Thus the theory papers in semester II shall be coded as 2T1 to 2T12 and so on. In case of the practical subject the same shall be coded as 1P1, 1P2 or 2P1,2P2 or 3P1,3P2 and so on depending upon the semester. Also the coding may be changed to convert it in Unique Subject Code.

- The five subject offered by the students at semester I level will remain unchanged till the final semester.
- 12) (a) The scope of the subjects shall be as prescribed in the syllabus.
 - (b) The medium of instruction and examination shall be English, Hindi, Marathi, except for the courses in Languages and Literature.
- 13) The maximum marks assigned to each paper and minimum marks, an examinee must obtain in order to pass the examination shall be as per clause 25 herein.
- 14) The practical examination of all semester will be conducted at the end of each semester as indicated in the table given below:

- The scheme of awarding internal marks shall as per clause 26 of this Direction.
- Successful examinees at the B.A. Sem-VI Examination who obtained not less than 60% marks (aggregate of Sem- I, II, III, IV, V and VI Examinations taken together) shall be placed in first division, those obtaining less than 60% but not less than 45% in second Division, and all other successful examinees below 45% in third division.
- There shall be no classification of successful candidates at Sem- I to Sem-V Examination. The division of the successful candidate shall be declared at the end six semester taking in to consideration the score of all six semesters. However at the end of every semester the University shall declare SGPA and CGPA of the candidate.
- An examinee successful in the minimum period prescribed for the examination, obtaining not less than 75% of the maximum marks prescribed in the subject shall be declared to have passed the examination with Distinction at that subject. Distinction shall not be awarded to an examinee availing of the provision of the exemptions and compartments at any of the examination.
- Provisions of Ordinance No, 7-A relating to the condonation of Deficiency of Marks for passing an examination and compartment as amended updated vide ordinance No. 45 of 1983 shall apply to the examinations under this Direction.
- The names of the successful examinee passing the examination as a whole in the minimum prescribed period and securing the grades equivalent to first and second division shall be arranged in order of merit as provided in ordinance 6 relating to examination in general.
- 21) No candidate shall be admitted to an examination under this Direction, if he / she has already passed the same examination of this university or of any other university. However, any person who has passed Final B.A. examination under this Direction Ordinances/Direction of this University or any of the First Degree Examination of this University or of any other Statutory University may on payment of the fee prescribed by the University, from time to time, be admitted to subsequent examination in one or more optional subject/s not offered by him/her in earlier examination, without being required to prosecute regular course of studies in the subject/s in a college. Such an examinee will be required to take simultaneously all the examinations of the six semesters leading to the Degree of Bachelor

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- of Arts in subject/s and on securing not less than the minimum passing marks prescribed for the subject/s shall be issued a certificate of having passed examination in the Additional subject/s as the case may be.

Computation of SGPA and CGPA

The UGC recommends the following procedure to compute the semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA):

i. The SGPA is the ratio of sum of the product of the number of credits with the grade points scored by a student in all the courses taken by a student and the sum of the number of credits of all the courses undergone by a student, i.e

SGPA (Si) =
$$\Sigma$$
(Ci xGi) / Σ Ci

Where Ci is the number of credits of the ith course and Gi is the grade point scored by the student in the ith course.

ii. The CGPA is also calculated in the same manner taking into account all the courses undergone by a student over all the semesters of a programme, i.e.

CGPA =
$$\Sigma$$
(Ci xSi) / Σ Ci

Where Si is the SGPA of the ith semester and Ci is the total number of credits in that semester.

iii .The SGPA and CGPA shall be rounded off to 2 decimal points and reported in the transcripts.

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26. Guidelines for Internal Assessment, Theory Paper and Practical:-

- 1. The internal assessment marks shall be awarded by the concerned teacher.
- 2. The internal assessment shall be completed by the College / University at least 15 days prior to the final examination of each semester. The Marks shall be sent to the University immediately after the assessment in the prescribed format.

General guidelines for Internal Assessment are:

- a) The internal assessment marks assigned to each theory paper shall be awarded on the basis of assignments like class test, attendance, home assignments, study tour, visit to educational institutions and research organizations, field work, group discussions or any other innovative practice / activity, as prescribed in the relevant syllabus.
- b) There shall be no separate / extra allotment of work load to the teacher concerned. He/ She shall conduct the internal assessment activity during the regular teaching days / periods as a part of regular teaching activity.
- c) The concerned teacher / department / college shall keep the record of all the above activities until six months after the declaration of the results of that semester.
- d) At the beginning of each semester, every teacher / department / college shall inform his / her students unambiguously the method he / she proposes to adopt and the scheme of marking for internal assessment, wherever the heads for award of internal marks are not specified in the syllabus of the paper.
- e) The teacher shall announce the schedule of activity for internal assessment in advance in consultation with HOD / Principal.
- f) Final submission of internal marks to the University shall be before the commencement of the University Theory / Practical examinations whichever is later.
- **27.** The scope of the subjects, paper pattern for theory examination and distribution of marks shall be as prescribed by the Board of Studies of the relevant subject and as given in the syllabus.

Practical Examination: 1. Practical examinations shall be of 3 to 8 28. hours duration for one or two days, depending on the subject and the number of students.

2. Each practical shall carry 40 marks. The distribution of the marks shall be as follows:

a. Record / Journal / Internal: 10 marks - Evaluated by assessment Internal

> 10 marks - Evaluated jointly external 8 internal examiners

b. Practical Performance:

20 marks - Evaluated by external examiner

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NOTES: i. Practical performance shall be jointly evaluated by the external and internal examiner. In case of differences, the external examiner's decision shall be final.

If the student fails to submit his / her certified Practical Record duly signed by the Teacher-In-Charge and the Head of the Department, he / she shall not be allowed to appear for the Practical Examination and no marks shall be allotted to the student.

The practical record of every student shall carry a certificate as shown iii. below, duly signed by the teacher-in-charge and the Head of the Department.

Saving: Notwithstanding the lapse of Direction No 11 of 2020, the students who had taken admission as per the provisions of the said Direction shall continue to be govern by the scheme of the examination and other provisions dealing with A.T.K.T. etc. thereunder, until such students complete their graduation program. On failure to complete the course within the permissible time and attempts such students, at their option, may be absorbed in the new course, under this Direction, as per the absorption scheme. Such student shall be eligible to get exemption in the equivalent subjects/papers which he/she has passed. The decision regarding equivalence of the subject shall be that of the Dean of the Faculty taken in consultation with the Chairman of the relevant Board of studies

Whereas, Maharashtra Public Universities Act 2016(VI of 2017)(hereinafter the Act) has come into force from 1st March, 2017;

AND

Whereas, the University has issued Direction to 27 of 2022 dealing with composition of the four faculties created by the Act, where under the earlier different faculties of the University have been merged into the four new faculties created by the Act, by which the subject of Business Administration has been included in the faculty of Commerce and Management;

AND

WHEREAS Direction No. 17 of 2018 entitled 'DIRECTION GOVERNING THE EXAMINATION LEADING TO THE DEGREE OF Bachelor of Commerce (B.Com) (CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM) (FACULTY OF COMMERCE AND MANAGEMENT), was issued by the Vice-Chancellor on 18.9.2018;

AND

Whereas, MHRD, New Delhi & UGC issued the guidelines for implementation of NEP 2020 in all universities in UG & PG programs from academic session 2022-23. So it is necessary to restructure the complete scheme of examination incorporating curriculum features as mentioned in NEP 2020;

AND

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Whereas, the Faculty of Commerce and Management in its meeting dated 24.6.22 has recommended to restructure the B.Com programme so as to meet the expectations of new National Education Policy 2020, the said programme is to commence from academic year 2022-23, it was also resolve to empower the Hon'ble Vice Chancellor to accept the scheme once prepared and accepted by the Board of Studies for Commerce, on behalf of the Faculty of Commerce and Management;

AND

Whereas, the Academic Council in its meeting held on 8.7. 2022 vide item No. 24 has considered, accepted the recommendation of Faculty of Commerce and Management whereby authorized the Vice Chancellor to accept the Scheme of Examination and syllabi prepared by the Board of Studies in Commerce for the programme of Bachelor of Commerce in order to give effect to the provisions of National Education Policy 2020;

AND

Whereas, the Board of Studies in its meeting dated 13.7.22 has accepted the detailed scheme of examination and syllabus for the Bachelor of Commerce with the option of award of Certificate and Diploma in between if the student so desires, as per the new National education Policy as prepared by the sub-committee with minor changes, the said programme is to commence from academic year 2022-23;

AND

Whereas, the Vice Chancellor has granted approval to the scheme of examination so prepared and accepted by the Board of Studies on behalf of the Faculty of Commerce and Management and the Academic Council as resolved by the Faculty of Commerce and Management and the Academic Council in their meetings dated 24.6.22 and 8.7.22 respectively;

AND

Whereas, Direction No. 17 of 2018 entitled "DIRECTION GOVERNING THE EXAMINATION LEADING TO THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF COMMERCE (B.COM.) (CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM) (FACULTY OF COMMERCE AND MANAGEMENT),", has lapsed by virtue of proviso to subsection (8) of section 12 of the Act as the said Direction could not be converted in to an Ordinance within the prescribed time and since Ordinance making is a time consuming process and there is an urgency to regularized the admissions and examinations of

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BACHELOR OF COMMERCE (B.Com.) (OUTCOME BASED)(CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM);

Now, therefore, I, Dr. Subhash R. Chaudhari, Vice-Chancellor Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur, in exercise of powers conferred upon me under provision of section 12(8) of the Maharashtra Public Universities Act, 2016, do hereby issue following Directions.

- 1. This Direction may be called 'ADMISSIONS AND EXAMINATIONS LEADING TO THE AWARD OF THE CERTIFICATE, DIPLOMA OR DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF COMMERCE (B.Com.) (OUTCOME BASED) (CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM), DIRECTION, 2022.
- 2. This Direction shall come into force from academic year 2022-23.
- 3. **INTERPRETATION CLAUSE**: In this Direction, unless the context requires otherwise the words, phrases and abbreviations used shall have following meaning:
 - a. "AEC" means the Ability Enhancement Course
 - b. "Academic Council" means Academic Council of R.T.M. Nagpur University.
 - c. "ATKT" refers to allowed to keep term in higher semester.
 - d. "Board of Studies" means Board of Studies for various subjects of commerce in the faculty of Commerce and Management in the University.
 - e. "CC" means Core Course
 - f. "CIE" means Continuous Internal Evaluation which refers to the Internal Assessment done at concerned college
 - g. "Competent Authority" (for admission purpose) means an "Authority" established or assigned the duty to regulate admissions in the course by the Government of Maharashtra or an authority constituted by the University, for this purpose.
 - h. "Credit Points" refer to the product of No. of credits multiplied by the Grade Point for a given course/paper.
 - i. "Credit" (C) for a course is dependent on the number of hours of instruction per week in that course, and is obtained by using a multiplier of one (1) for lecture and a multiplier of half (1/2) for practical (laboratory) hours.
 - j. "Course" means a paper/subject (theory or practical) prescribed for any semester of the programme.

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- k. "Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)" refers to the Cumulative Grade Point Average weighted across all semesters (6 semesters)
- 1. "DSE" means Discipline Specific Elective Course
- m. "Degree" means the Under Graduate Degree awarded after successful completion of the programme governed by this Direction.
- n. "Fees" means the fees prescribed by the University/ Shikshan Shulka Samiti of Government of Maharashtra, for the Under Graduate programme under this Direction, from time to time.
- o. "GE" means Generic Elective Course
- p. "Grade letter" is an index to indicate the performance of a student in a particular course (Paper). It is the transformation of actual marks secured by a student in a course/paper. Grade letters are O, A, B, C, P, F and AB.
- q. "Grade Point" is the weightage allotted to each grade letter depending on the range of marks awarded in a course/paper.
- r. "Graduate programme" means Bachelors' degree programme in Commerce.
- s. "MOOC" means Massive Open Online Course offered by SWAYAM/NPTEL or any other recognized University or Institution
- t. "SEC" means Skill Enhancement Course
- u. "Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA)" refers to the performance of the student in a given semester. SGPA is based on the total credit points earned by the student in all the courses and the total number of credits assigned to the courses/papers in a Semester.
- v. "Student" means student admitted to Bachelors degree programme in commerce under this direction.
- w. "ODL" means Online and Distance Learning
- x. "University" means Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University.
- 4. There shall be Six Examinations leading to the degree of Bachelor of Commerce (B.Com.) namely:
 - (1) The Bachelor of Commerce (B.Com.) 1st Semester Examination,
 - (2) The Bachelor of Commerce (B.Com.) 2nd Semester Examination,
 - (3) The Bachelor of Commerce (B.Com.) 3rd Semester Examination,
 - (4) The Bachelor of Commerce (B.Com.) 4th Semester Examination,

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- (5) The Bachelor of Commerce (B.Com.) 5th Semester Examination and
- (6) The **Bachelor of Commerce (B.Com.)** 6th Semester Examination.
- 5. The duration of the Degree Course under this shall be of three academic years divided into six semesters with the B.Com. 1st and 2nd Semester Examinations during the first academic year, the B.Com. 3rd and 4th Semester Examinations during the second year and the B.Com. 5th and 6th Semester Examinations during the third year.
- 6. The examinations specified in paragraph 4 above shall be held twice a year at such places and on such dates as may be fixed by the University.
- 7. The details of eligibility for **B.Com. Sem I** examination:
- (A) For the **B.Com. 1st Semester**, Examinee shall have Passed the 12th Standard Examination of the Maharashtra State Board of Secondary and Higher Secondary Education, with English at Higher or Lower level and any Modern Indian Language at higher or lower level with any combination of optional subjects.

OR

XII Standard Examination of Maharashtra State Board of Secondary and Higher Secondary Education in Vocational Stream with one language only; OR any other examination recognized as equivalent thereto; in such subjects and with such standards of attainments as may be prescribed Minimum Competition vocation course (MCVC).

OR

Any other Equivalent Examination of any State/Central/International Board in (10+2) pattern with any combination of subjects.

- 8. A collegiate candidate shall have pursued a regular course of study for not less than 90 days of the academic session before being examined for any semester examination of **B.Com.** in any recognized institution and or college affiliated to Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University where the course is conducted.
- 9. An applicant for the Bachelor of Commerce 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th or 6th Semester Examination shall have passed an examination specified in Clauses (A) of paragraph 7 not less than one academic year prior to his admission to the respective examination.
- 10. Without prejudice to the other provisions of Ordinance No. 6 relating to the Examinations in General, the provisions of Paragraphs 5, 7, 8, 10, 26 and 31 of the said Ordinance shall apply to every collegiate candidate.
- 11. The fees for the examination shall be as prescribed by the University from time to time and whenever any change is made in the fees prescribed for any examination that shall be notified through a notification for information of the examinees concerned.
- 12. Teaching and Examination Scheme for examinees of Bachelor of Commerce 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th, and 6th Semester Examinations shall be as given below:

13. Assessment

- The final total assessment of the candidates is made in terms of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) and an external assessment for each course/subject taken together.
- For each paper (other than Internship), 20 marks will be Continuous Internal Evaluation and 80 marks for semester end examination (external assessment) to be conducted at college level (Odd semesters examinations) and RTM Nagpur University level (Even semester examinations)
- All subjects shall have a wokload of 5 periods per week, including 4 periods of theory and 1 period for classroom activity-based teaching per week. For Compulsory English 1 additional Tutorial period for a batch of 20 students is allotted.
- Expected classroom activities shall consist of the following: (a) Group Discussion (b) Seminars (c) Power Point Presentations (d) Elocution (e) Debate (f) Role Play (g) Case Studies (h) Educational Games. The teacher is expected to undertake a minimum of four of the aforesaid activity.

• Each subject teacher must circulate the list of minimum 5 activities/practical of fields assignment/mini project/market surveys/research papers & research/live projects etc. (based on 5 COs) at the beginning of course and evaluate the same for 10 marks as per 1c above.

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- There shall be no separate / extra allotment of workload to the concerned teacher. He/ She shall conduct the CIE activity during the regular teaching days / periods as a part of regular teaching activity.
- The internal marks will be communicated to the University at the end of each semester, but before the semester end examinations / as instructed by university. These marks will be considered for the declaration of the results.
- The record of internal marks, evaluation & result should be maintained for a period of one year by respective institute/college for verification by competent authority.

The maximum and minimum marks which each subject carries in B.Com. Semester - I, Semester - III, Semester - IV, Semester - V & Semester - VI Examination are as indicated in Paragraph 12. A, B, C, D, E & F respectively

- 14. (A) The scope of the subjects and pattern of examination shall be as indicated in the Syllabus (Appendix 2)
 - (B) The Medium of instructions and examinations shall be in ENGLISH or HINDI or MARATHI.
 - (C) The Maximum/minimum marks which each subject carries & workload in B.Com. 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th Semester Examination shall be as indicated in Examination & Teaching Scheme (item no 12) "A", "B", "C", "D", "E" and "F" respectively.

Internship and its evaluation

During the fifth semester, those students who opt for SEC 5 as "Internship" will have to undergo an internship of 6-10 weeks (Minimum 120 hours) with industry, business, service or social organization. Article ship attended during the fifth semester of B.Com. for Professional Courses like CA/CS/ICWA/CMA/CFA, etc. will be considered as "Internship" provided appropriate documentary proofs are submitted by the student. Students should submit an authentic Internship Project Completion Certificate issued by the competent authority of the business/institution under whom the internship is undertaken. The respective college will assess and evaluate the same as per parameters (like PowerPoint Presentation, Brief Report, etc.) laid down by the college from time to time.

15. Standard of Passing

The scope of the subject, percentage of passing in Theory and Project and CIE will be governed as per following rules:

- (i) In order to pass the Bachelor of Commerce (B.Com.) 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th Semester Examinations, an examinee shall obtain not less than 40 % marks in each paper, that is a student must obtain 40 marks in the written Examination conducted by the College/University and in internal assessment (CIE) put together.
- (ii) An examinee who is unsuccessful at the examination shall be eligible for admission to the subsequent examinations on payment of a fresh fee prescribed for the examination together with the conditions of the ordinance in force from time to time.

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16. Credit and Grade Point System:

A. Conversion of Marks to Grades and Calculations of SGPA (Grade Point Average) and CGPA (Cumulative Grade Point Average): In the Credit and Grade Point System, the assessment of individual Courses in the concerned examinations will be on the basis of marks only, but the marks shall later be converted into Grades by some mechanism wherein the overall performance of the Learners can be reflected after considering the Credit Points for any given course. However, the overall evaluation shall be designated in terms of Grade. There are some abbreviations used here that need an understanding of each and every parameter involved in grade computation and the evaluation mechanism. The abbreviations and formulae used are as follows:

Abbreviations and Formulae Used

G: Grade

GP: Grade Points

C: Credits

CP: Credit Points

CG: Credits X Grades (Product of credits & Grades)

SGPA = Σ CG: Sum of Product of Credits & Grades points / Σ C: Sum of Credits points

SGPA: Semester Grade Point Average shall be calculated for individual semesters. (It is also designated as GPA)

CGPA: Cumulative Grade Point Average shall be calculated for the entire Programme by considering all the semesters taken together.

CGPA to Percentage (%) conversion formula: Percentage (%) = (CGPA) * 10

After calculating the SGPA for an individual semester and the CGPA for entire program, the value can be matched with the grade in the Grade Point table as per the ten (10) Points Grading System and expressed as a single designated GRADE such as O, A, B, C, D, P and F

A student obtaining Grade F shall be considered failed and will be required to reappear in the examination.

- **B.** Division at the B.Com. semester VI_examination shall be declared on the basis of the aggregate marks at the B.Com. semester I, semester II, semester III, semester IV, semester V and semester VI examinations taken together and the CGPA will be calculated and notified.
- C. The successful examinees at the B.Com. semester VI examination shall be awarded division based on CGPA
- **D.** The percentage of passing marks in each subject shall be as indicated in Examination Scheme (item no 12) "A", "B", "C", "D", "E" and "F" respectively.
- **E.** Unsuccessful examinees at the above examinations can be readmitted to the same examination on payment of a fresh fee and such other fees as may be prescribed.
- **<u>F.</u>** Provisions of **Ordinance No. 3 of 2007** relating to the award of Grace Marks for passing an examination, securing higher division / class and for securing distinction in subject(s) shall be applicable.
- **G.** University guidelines and directions issued from time to time regarding Improvement of Results, Reassessment/Revaluation and Incentive Marks shall be applicable to B. Com. Program covered under this direction.
- **<u>H.</u>** Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Direction, no person shall be admitted to an examination under this Ordinance, if he/ she has already passed the same examination or an equivalent examination of any other University.
- <u>I.</u> Examinees passing all the **Bachelor of Commerce (B.Com.)** Examination shall on payment of the prescribed fees shall receive a Degree in the prescribed form signed by the Vice-Chancellor.
- <u>J.</u> The aforesaid Amendment shall come into force from the date of its issuance and shall remain in force till the relevant Ordinance comes into being in accordance with the provisions of the Maharashtra Public Universities. Act, 2016 (Mah. Act No. VI of 2017).
- **K.** The marks for internal assessment should be communicated to the University within the time limit as per university norms. The record of conduct of such examination, evaluation and marks for internal assessment should be maintained for a period of at least **one** year by the respective college / Department for the verification by the competent authority.

17. Promotion to Higher Semester (A.T.K.T.):

<u>A.</u> The unsuccessful candidate of any semester examination shall be ALLOWED TO KEEP THE TERM (ATKT) in accordance with the following table: (Theory and Internal assessment of that theory subject shall be jointly considered as single passing head).

C. Pattern of Question Papers of B.Com. year end Examination:

- a. The question paper should be set in such a manner to cover the complete syllabus as prescribed by the University.
- b. The Semester End examination shall be held as per the schedule notified by the University.
- c. The question paper shall be of 80 marks & the time duration of the Semester End examination would be 3 hours.
- d. Question Paper Pattern for the courses included in this syllabus will be as per Appendix 2
- e. The paper setters /moderators shall submit the proposed marking scheme (Memorandum of Instructions) along with the question paper so that the students can be given due credit for precise answers.

18. Absorption Scheme for Examinees of B.Com. CBS Pattern Course (Introduced in 2016):

I. The students of the B.Com. CBS Syllabus (Introduced in 2016) immediately preceding the new course under this direction shall be given a chance to appear for **Five** more consecutive examinations according to the old B.Com. CBS syllabus (Introduced in 2016). The College shall conduct the examinations of odd semesters whereas the University shall conduct the examination of even semester courses for **five** more consecutive examinations after the new scheme of examination is introduced as per following table:

The students are required to clear all their papers within the stipulated time. The students clearing all the papers of the old scheme of Examination (B.Com. CBS Syllabus Introduced in 2016) shall be awarded a Degree according to the old scheme of Examination. But the students who failed to clear their course/s in 5 consecutive attempts as per this clause, will be absorbed in the scheme of examination under this direction as per following guidelines:

- A. The candidates who have cleared B.Com. 1st year (Semester I and II) of the old course (CBS Pattern Introduced in 2016) examination shall be eligible for admission to B.Com. 2nd Year of the new course (CBCS) but in such case the student will have to clear all those subjects (B.Com. Sem I and II) which were not included in the previous CBS syllabus (introduced in 2016) but are part of the new syllabus.
- **B.** The candidates who have cleared B.Com. 2nd year (Semester I to IV) of the old course (CBS Pattern Introduced in 2016) examination shall be eligible for admission to B.Com. 3rd Year of the new course (CBCS) but in such case the student will have to clear all those subjects (B.Com. Sem I, II, III and IV) which were not included in the previous CBS syllabus (introduced in 2016) but are part of new syllabus.

II. CLARIFICATION ON ABSORPTION SCHEME

The absorption of students of previous CBS course (Introduced in 2016) referred above shall be made to the new course in the following manner:

Situation I: A student had completed 1st year of B.Com. as per CBS syllabus (introduced in 2016) but due to some reasons the student is dropped out for subsequent years of the previous syllabus (B.Com. CBS Syllabus)

A student who has passed all courses of B.Com. 1st year CBS Pattern Programme (Introduced in 2016), shall be admitted to B.Com. 2nd Year CBCS Pattern but he/ she must complete those courses which are not considered to be equivalent with the previous CBS pattern examination. In such a case a student will be required to take nominal admission to B.Com. 1st year under this new direction by paying Rs. 500 and will fill and submit the exam form of B.Com. 1st and/or 2nd Semester of the new

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syllabus (as per this direction) for those courses only which are not considered to be equivalent courses with old syllabus (B.Com. CBS syllabus). The student will also be allowed to fill and submit the regular exam form semester III.

Situation II: A students has not completed 1st year of B.Com. as per CBS syllabus (introduced in 2016) but have cleared few of the courses of 1st year and is dropped out for subsequent years of the previous syllabus (B.Com. CBS Syllabus)

A student who has cleared 6 or more courses of B.Com. CBS syllabus (introduced in 2016) and has backlogs in remaining courses will be allowed to take admission into 2nd year of B.Com. CBCS Pattern under this direction, but he/she must complete those courses which are not considered to be equivalent with the previous CBS pattern examination. In such a case a student will be required to take nominal admission to B.Com. 1st year under this new direction by paying Rs. 500 and will fill and submit the exam form of B.Com. 1st and/or 2nd Semester of the new syllabus (as per this direction) for those courses only which are not considered to be equivalent courses with old syllabus (B.Com. CBS syllabus). The student will also be allowed to fill and submit the regular exam form semester III.

A student who has backlog in 7 or more courses of B.Com. CBS syllabus (introduced in 2016). In such a case a student will not be eligible for admission to B.Com. 2nd year CBCS Pattern and will be required to take nominal admission to B.Com. 1st year under this new direction by paying Rs. 500 and will fill and submit the exam form of B.Com. 1st and/or 2nd Semester of the new syllabus (as per this direction) for those courses only which are not considered to be equivalent courses with old syllabus (B.Com. CBS syllabus). The student will be able to take admission in 2nd year after successful completion of B.Com. 1st year under this new syllabus.

Situation III: A students has completed 2nd year of B.Com. as per CBS syllabus (introduced in 2016) and have cleared all the courses of 2nd Year and is drop out for subsequent years of the previous syllabus (B.Com. CBS Syllabus)

A student who has passed all courses of B.Com. 1st year and 2nd year under CBS Pattern Syllabus (Introduced in 2016), shall be admitted to B.Com 3rd Year CBCS Pattern but he/she must complete those courses which are not considered to be equivalent with the previous CBS pattern examination. In such a case a student will be required to take nominal admission to B.Com. 1st and 2nd year under this new direction by paying Rs. 500 for each year and will fill and submit the exam form of B.Com. 1st to 4th semester of the new syllabus (as per this direction) for those courses only which are not considered to be equivalent courses with old syllabus (B.Com. CBS syllabus). The student will also be allowed to fill and submit the regular exam form semester V.

Situation IV: A students has not completed 2nd year of B.Com. as per CBS syllabus (introduced in 2016) but have cleared few of the courses of 2nd Year and is drop out for subsequent years of the previous syllabus (B.Com. CBS Syllabus)

A student who has passed 6 or more courses of B.Com. 2nd year under CBS Pattern Syllabus (Introduced in 2016) and has backlogs for remaining courses, shall be

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admitted to B.Com. 3rd Year CBCS Pattern but he/she must complete those courses which are not considered to be equivalent with the previous CBS pattern examination. In such a case a student will be required to take nominal admission to B.Com. 1st and 2nd year under this new direction by paying Rs. 500 for each year and will fill and submit the exam form of B.Com. 1st to 4th semester of the new syllabus (as per this direction) for those courses only which are not considered to be equivalent courses with old syllabus (B.Com. CBS syllabus). The student will also be allowed to fill and submit the regular exam form semester V.

A student has backlogs in 7 or more courses of B.Com. 2nd year under CBS Pattern Syllabus (Introduced in 2016) and has cleared the remaining courses. In such a case a student will be required to take nominal admission to B.Com. 1st and 2nd year under this new direction by paying Rs. 500 for each year and will fill and submit the exam form of B.Com. 1st to 4th semester of the new syllabus (as per this direction) for those courses only which are not considered to be equivalent courses with old syllabus (B.Com. CBS syllabus). Such student shall be admitted to B.Com. 3rd Year only after successful completion of those courses which are not considered to be equivalent with the previous CBS pattern examination.

(*) All these subjects have no equivalent subjects in the B.Com. Previous Course (CBS Pattern) Examination (introduced in 2016). Hence, students desiring for absorption in New Course (CBCS Pattern) under this Direction are mandatorily required to appear for these subjects in respective semesters.

The above absorption scheme of B.Com. shall be effective till the introduction of new Syllabus.

19. Provision for Multiple Exit

The B.Com. program offered under this direction provides an opportunity to students for multiple exits from the program as per following conditions:

- a. A student can exit the program after successful completion of 1st and 2nd Semester courses and obtaining 48 credits. Such a student is eligible to be awarded 'Certificate in Commerce' by the University.
- b. A student can exit the program after successful completion of 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th Semester courses and obtaining 96 credits. Such a student is eligible to be awarded 'Diploma in Commerce' by the University.
- c. A student who has completed the 3 years program and earned 144 credits will be considered eligible for award of 'Bachelor of Commerce' degree by the University.

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- d. A student who wishes to exit the program before completion of 3 years is required to apply to the university through Principal.
- e. A student who opted for exit from the program before completion of 3 years (a & b) above shall be eligible for admission to next year of the program in any subsequent academic session. However, if at the time of admission, if this scheme of examination is not in force, the student will have to complete the program according to the provisions made under the direction prevailing at the time of such admission.

20. Provision for Transfer of Credits

B.Com. program offered under this direction provides enhanced academic flexibility to students in terms of selecting the courses they want to learn. A student can opt for any course from any statutory/recognized University or any recognized online learning platform such as SWAYAM/NPTEL in lieu of a course (except Core Course and Discipline Specific Electives) mentioned in this scheme of examination. Similarly, a student can opt for transfer of credits by successfully completing the course recognized by the 'Adult and Continuing Education Centre' of Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University. The mechanism for transfer of credits earned through these courses to be adhered is mentioned here:

- 1. A student seeking for facility for transfer of credits earned from any other platform will have to mandatorily open an account with 'Academic Bank of Credits' and upload the credits so earned therein.
- 2. Any Core Course or Discipline Specific Elective mentioned in this scheme of examination cannot be opted out by a student.
- 3. A student can opt out any course other than Core Course/Discipline Specific Elective and earn equal number of credits by completing any ODL or Online course/s from any statutory/recognized University or any recognized online learning platform such as SWAYAM/NPTEL.
- 4. A student can opt out any course other than Core Course/ Discipline Specific Elective and earn equal number of credits by successfully completing the course recognized by the 'Adult and Continuing Education Centre' of Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University.
- 5. If a student is willing to opt out any such course, he/she will have to mention this while submitting the examination form to the University for respective semester.
- 6. A certificate of completion of such an ODL/Online course shall be submitted by the student to the University through college before end term evaluation.

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7. Such a certificate shall mandatorily have the number of credits, duration of the course and grades obtained by the student and shall preferably have a QR code for verification.

grades commed by the student and shan preferably have a QR code for verification.

8. The college shall submit the grades and marks obtained by the student to the University along

with Internal Assessment marks for the concerned examination.

9. If a student has opted for an ODL/Online course in a particular semester and failed to submit

the certificate within prescribed time, the student will be marked for 'Absent' for a particular

course in that examination. Such a student will be required to fill in the examination form in

the consecutive attempt and submit the passing certificate to get his/her corrected result.

10. The procedure for transfer of credits mentioned under this direction is subject to the

guidelines issued by the University in this regard and a separate direction for the said purpose

shall be issued by the University.

21. Eligibility for award of Degree:

In order to become eligible for award of 'Bachelor of Commerce (B.Com.)' degree, a student

must fulfil the following conditions:

a. A student must earn minimum 144 credits in not less than 3 years.

b. A student must successfully complete (pass) all Core Courses and Discipline Specific

Electives mentioned in this direction.

22. This direction shall come into force phase wise from the academic session 2022-23.

23. If any question of interpretation of any clause arises for this Direction & Appendix I & II the same shall be referred to the Dean, Faculty of Commerce and Management, whose

decision shall be final and binding on all concerned.

WHEREAS Direction No. 23 of 2017 entitled 'DIRECTION GOVERNING THE EXAMINATION LEADING TO THE DEGREE OF Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) (CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM) (FACULTY OF COMMERCE AND MANAGEMENT), was issued by the Vice-Chancellor on on 29th August 2017

AND

Whereas, MHRD, New Delhi & UGC issued the guidelines for implementation of NEP 2020 in all universities in UG & PG programs from academic session 2022-23. So it is necessary to restructure the complete scheme of examination incorporating curriculum features as mentioned in NEP 2020.

AND

Whereas, the Faculty of Commerce and Management in its meeting dated 24.6.22 has recommended to restructure the BBA programme so as to meet the expectations of new National Education Policy 2020, the said programme is to commence from academic year

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2022-23, it was also resolve to empower the Hon'ble Vice Chancellor to accept the scheme once prepared and accepted by the Board of Studies for Business Management, on behalf of the Faculty of Commerce and Management;

AND

Whereas, the Academic Council in its meeting held on 8.7. 2022 vide item No. 22 has considered, accepted the recommendation of Faculty of Commercee and Management whereby authorized the Vice Chancellor to accept the Scheme of Examination and syllabi prepared by the Board of Studies in Business Management for the programme of Bachelor of Business Management in order to give effect to the provisions of National Education Policy 2020;

AND

Whereas, the Board of Studies in its meeting dated 13.7.22 has accepted the detailed scheme of examination and syllabus for the Bachelor of Business management with the option of award of Certificate and Diploma in between if the student so desires, as per the new National education Policy as prepared by the sub-committee with minor changes, the said programme is to commence from academic year 2022-23;

AND

Whereas, the Vice Chancellor has granted approval to the scheme of examination so prepared and accepted by the Board of Studies on behalf of the Faculty of Commerce and Management and the Academic Council as resolved by the Faculty of Commerce and Management and the Academic Council in their meetings dated 24.6.22 and 8.7.22 respectively;

AND

Whereas, Direction No. 23 of 2017 entitled "DIRECTION GOVERNING THE EXAMINATION LEADING TO THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION (BBA) (CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM) (FACULTY OF COMMERCE AND MANAGEMENT),", has lapsed by virtue of proviso to subsection (8) of section 12 of the Act as the said Direction could not be converted in to an Ordinance within the prescribed time and since Ordinance making is a time consuming process and there is an urgency to regularized the admissions and examinations of BACHELOR OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION (BBA) (OUTCOME BASED)(CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM)

Now, therefore, I, Dr. Subhash R. Chaudhari, Vice-Chancellor Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur, in exercise of powers conferred upon me under provision of section 12(8) of the Maharashtra Public Universities Act, 2016, do hereby issue following Directions.

- 1. This Direction may be called 'ADMISSIONS AND EXAMINATIONS LEADING TO THE AWARD OF THE CERTIFICATE, DIPLOMA OR DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF BUSSINESS ADMINISTARTION (BBA) (OUTCOME BASED) (CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM), DIRECTION, 2022
- 2. This Direction shall come into force from the academic year 2022-23.

3. INTERPRETATION CLAUSE:

In this Direction, unless the context requires otherwise the words, phrases and abbreviations shall have following meaning:-

- a. "AEC" means the Ability Enhancement Course
- b. "Academic Council" means Academic Council of R.T.M. Nagpur University.
- c. "ATKT" refers to allowed to keep term in higher semester.
- d. "Board of Studies" means Board of Studies for various subjects of commerce in the faculty of Commerce and Management in the University.
- e. "CC" means Core Course.
- f. "CIE" means Continuous Internal Evaluation which refers to the Internal Assessment done at concerned college.
- g. "Competent Authority" (for admission purpose) means an "Authority" established or assigned the duty to regulate admissions in the course by the Government of Maharashtra or an authority constituted by the University, for this purpose.
- h. "Credit Points" refer to the product of No. of credits multiplied by the Grade Point for a given course/paper.
- i. "Credit" (C) for a course is dependent on the number of hours of instruction per week in that course, and is obtained by using a multiplier of one (1) for lecture and a multiplier of half (1/2) for practical (laboratory) hours.
- j. "Course" means a paper/subject (theory or practical) prescribed for any semester of the programme.
- k. "Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)" refers to the Cumulative Grade Point Average weighted across all semesters (6 semesters)
- 1. "DSE" means Discipline Specific Elective Course
- m. "Degree" means the Under Graduate Degree awarded after successful completion of the programme governed by this Direction.
- n. "Fees" means the fees prescribed by the University/ Shikshan Shulka Samiti of Government of Maharashtra, for the Under Graduate programme under this Direction, from time to time.
- o. "GE" means Generic Elective Course
- p. "Grade letter" is an index to indicate the performance of a student in a particular course (Paper). It is the transformation of actual marks secured by a student in a course/paper. Grade letters are O, A, B, C, P, F and AB.

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- q. "Grade Point" is the weightage allotted to each grade letter depending on the range of marks awarded in a course/paper.
- r. "Graduate programme" means Bachelors' degree programme in Commerce (Computer Application).
- s. "MOOC" means Massive Open Online Course offered by SWAYAM/NPTEL or any other recognized University or Institution
- t. "SEC" means Skill Enhancement Course
- u. "Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA)" refers to the performance of the student in a given semester. SGPA is based on the total credit points earned by the student in all the courses and the total number of credits assigned to the courses/papers in a Semester.
- v. "Student" means student admitted to Bachelors degree programme in commerce under this direction.
- w. "ODL" means Online and Distance Learning
- x. "University" means Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University.
- 4. There shall be Six Examinations leading to the degree of Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) namely:
 - (1) The Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) 1st Semester Examination,
 - (2) The Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) 2nd Semester Examination,
 - (3) The Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) 3rd Semester Examination,
 - (4) The Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) 4th Semester Examination,
 - (5) The Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) 5th Semester Examination and
 - (6) The Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) 6th Semester Examination.
- 5.The duration of the Degree Course under this shall be of three academic years divided into six semesters with the BBA 1^{st} and 2^{nd} Semester Examinations during the first academic year, the BBA 3^{rd} and 4^{th} Semester Examinations during the second year and the BBA 5^{th} and 6^{th} Semester Examinations during the third year.
- 6.The examinations specified in paragraph 3 above shall be held twice a year at such places and on such dates as may be fixed by the University.
- 7. The details of eligibility for BBA Sem I examination and admission:
 - (A) For the **BBA 1**st **Semester**, Examinee shall have Passed the 12th Standard Examination of the Maharashtra State Board of Secondary and Higher Secondary Education, with English at Higher or Lower level and any Modern Indian Language at higher or lower level with any combination of optional subjects.

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XII Standard Examination of Maharashtra State Board of Secondary and Higher Secondary Education in Vocational Stream with one language only; OR any other

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examination recognized as equivalent thereto; in such subjects and with such standards of attainments as may be prescribed Minimum Competition vocation course (MCVC).

OR

Any other Equivalent Examination of any State / Central/ International Board in (10+2) pattern with any combination of subjects.

- 8. A collegiate candidate shall have pursued a regular course of study for not less than 90 days of the academic session before being examined for any semester examination of BBA in any recognized institution and or college affiliated to Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University where the course is conducted.
- 9. An applicant for the Bachelor of Business Administration 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th or 6th Semester Examination shall have passed an examination specified in Clauses (A) of paragraph 6 not less than one academic year prior to his admission to the respective examination.
- 10. Without prejudice to the other provisions of Ordinance No. 6 relating to the Examinations in General, the provisions of Paragraphs 5, 7, 8, 10, 26 and 31 of the said Ordinance shall apply to every collegiate candidate.
- 11. The fees for the examination shall be as prescribed by the University from time to time and whenever any change is made in the fees prescribed for any examination that shall be notified through a notification for information of the examinees concerned.
- 12. Teaching and Examination Scheme for examinees of Bachelor of Business Administration 1^{st} , 2^{nd} , 3^{rd} , 4^{th} , 5^{th} , and 6^{th} Semester Examinations shall be as given below:

13. Assessment

- The final total assessment of the candidates is made in terms of an Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) and an external assessment for each course/subject taken together.
- For each paper (other than Practical, Internship and Project), 20 marks will be Continuous Internal Evaluation and 80 marks for semester end examination (external assessment) to be conducted at college level (Odd semesters examinations) and RTM Nagpur University level (Even semester examinations)

- Each subject teacher must circulate the list of minimum 5 activities/practical of fields assignment/mini project/market surveys/research papers & research/live projects etc. to be done in group of maximum 4 students (based on 5 COs) at the beginning of course and evaluate the same for 10 marks as per 1c above.
- There shall be no separate / extra allotment of workload to the concerned teacher. He/ She shall conduct the CIE activity during the regular teaching days / periods as a part of regular teaching activity.
- The internal marks will be communicated to the University at the end of each semester, but before the semester end examinations / as instructed by university. These marks will be considered for the declaration of the results.
- The record of internal marks, evaluation & result should be maintained for a period of one year by respective institute/college for verification by competent authority.

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- 14. (A) The scope of the subjects and pattern of examination shall be as indicated in the Syllabus (Appendix II)
 - (B) The Medium of instructions and examinations shall be in ENGLISH only.

(C)The Maximum/minimum marks which each subject carries & workload in BBA 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th Semester Examination shall be as indicated in Examination & Teaching Scheme (item no 12) "A", "B", "C", "D", "E" and "F" respectively.

Internship and its evaluation (CC 12)

At the end of fourth semester, all students will have to undergo internship which may be a Field Survey/ Research Projects of 4-6 weeks (Minimum 120 hours) with an industrial, business, service, or social organization by taking a project study. The condition of successfully completing the program shall not be deemed to have been satisfied unless a student undergoes summer training under the supervision of the department in organizations as approved by the Director/ Principal/ Head / Faculty from time to time. Alternatively, the Director/ Principal/ Head / Faculty of the Department/ College/ Institute may allocate the sector/ industry/ company specific project to the individual student. Each student will be required to submit a **Internship** project report to the Department/ College/ Institute for the work undertaken during this period within three weeks of commencement of the **Fifth** semester for the purpose of evaluation in the **Fifth** semester. The evaluation will be of 100 marks. The evaluation will be internal at college level. The detailed parameters for evaluation of Internship will be provided by the colleges at the time of its assessment and evaluation.

- a. For Project work, Maximum 10 groups (each group comprising maximum 4 students) per guide /supervisor must be allotted by the Institute. The Guide/Supervisor shall act as an internal examiner for project Examination and award marks to individual students in these groups at the time of Presentation and Open Defense Seminar.
- b. The guide or the supervisor shall be appointed by the institute and should be full time approved faculty to BBA / MBA Programme or PhD supervisor in Business Management and Administration.
- c. The External examiner shall be appointed from the list of full-time approved teaching faculty of the BBA / MBA program or PhD supervisor in Business Management and Administration by the University.

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- d. Each such External examiner shall examine a maximum of 20 groups (Projects) of final SEMESTER students and award marks to individual students in these groups.
- e. One copy of Project work (Printed & Binded) shall be submitted to the College/Department, at least **One Month** prior to the date of commencement of Semester-VI Examination for evaluation purpose. The College/Department shall retain the copy of Project Work and the list of 'Project Work Titles' shall be submitted to the University.
- f. A Candidate shall submit with his/her/their project work, a certificate from the Supervisor to the effect.
- g. That the candidate has satisfactorily completed the Project work for not less than one session and
- h. That the Project work is the result of the candidates own work and is of sufficiently high standard to warrant its presentation for examination.
- i. Candidate shall submit his declaration that the Project is the result of his own research work and the same has not been previously submitted to any examination of this University or any other University. The Project shall be liable to be rejected and /or cancelled if found otherwise.
- j. The Project work shall be evaluated through seminar and open defense and Viva-voce at the College/ Department by internal and external examiners appointed by university before Semester VI examination.
- k. A student appearing for BBA Semester VI Examination will have to pay additional fees for evaluation of project as prescribed by the University from time to time.

15. Standard of Passing

The scope of the subject, percentage of passing in Theory and Project and CIE will be governed as per following rules:

- (i) In order to pass the Bachelor of Business Administration (B.B.A.) 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th Semester Examinations, and an examinee shall obtain not less than 40 % marks in each paper, that is a student must obtain 40 marks in the written Examination conducted by the College/University and in internal assessment (CIE) put together.
- (ii) An examinee who is unsuccessful at the examination shall be eligible for admission to the subsequent examinations on payment of a fresh fee prescribed for the examination together with the conditions of the ordinance in force from time to time.

16. Credit and Grade Point System:

A. Conversion of Marks to Grades and Calculations of SGPA (Grade Point Average) and CGPA (Cumulative Grade Point Average): In the Credit and Grade Point System, the assessment of individual Courses in the concerned examinations will be on the basis of marks only, but the marks shall later be converted into Grades by some mechanism wherein the overall performance of the Learners can be reflected after considering the Credit Points for any given course. However, the overall evaluation shall be designated in terms of Grade. There are some abbreviations used here that need understanding of each and every parameter involved in grade computation and the evaluation mechanism. The abbreviations and formulae used are as follows: -

A student obtaining Grade F shall be considered failed and will be required to reappear in the examination.

- **B.** Division at the BBA semester VI_examination shall be declared on the basis of the aggregate marks at the BBA semester I, semester II, semester III, semester IV, semester V and semester VI examination taken together and the CGPA will be calculated and notified.
- C. The successful examinees at the BBA semester VI examination shall be awarded division based on CGPA
- **D.** The percentage of passing marks in each subject shall be as indicated in Examination Scheme (item no 12) "A", "B", "C", "D", "E" and "F" respectively.
- **E.** Unsuccessful examinees at the above examinations can be readmitted to the same examination on payment of a fresh fee and such other fees as may be prescribed.

- <u>F.</u> Provisions of **Ordinance No. 3 of 2007** relating to the award of Grace Marks for passing an examination, securing higher division / class and for securing distinction in subject(s) shall be applicable.
- **G.** University guidelines & direction updated from time to time regarding Improvement of results, Revaluation/Reassessment and Incentive Marks shall be applicable to BBA program governed by this direction.
- <u>H.</u> Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Direction, no person shall be admitted to an examination under this Ordinance, if he/ she has already passed the same examination or an equivalent examination of any other University.
- L Examinees passing all the **Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA)** Examination shall on payment of the prescribed fees shall receive a Degree in the prescribed form signed by the Vice-Chancellor.
- J. The aforesaid Amendment shall come into force from the date of its issuance and shall remain in force till the relevant Ordinance comes into being in accordance with the provisions of the Maharashtra Public Universities. Act, 2016(Mah. Act No. VI of 2017).
- **K.** The marks for internal assessment should be communicated to the University within the time limit as per university norms. The record of conduct of such examination, evaluation and marks for internal assessment should be maintained for a period of at least **one** year by the respective college / Department for the verification by the competent authority.

17. Promotion to Higher Semester (A.T.K.T.):

C. Pattern of Question Papers of BBA year end Examination:

- a. The question paper should be set in such a manner to cover the complete syllabus as prescribed by the University.
- b. The Semester End examination shall be held as per the schedule notified by the University.
- c. The question paper shall be of 80 marks & the time duration of the Semester End examination would be 3 hours.
- d. Question Paper Pattern for the courses included in this syllabus will be as per Appendix II
- e. The paper setters /moderators shall submit the proposed marking scheme (Memorandum of Instructions) along with the question paper so that the students can be given due credit for precise answers.

18. Absorption Scheme for Examinees of BBA CBS Pattern Course (Introduced in 2016):

I. The students of the BBA CBS Syllabus (Introduced in 2016) immediately preceding the new course under this direction shall be given a chance to appear for **Five** more consecutive examinations according to old BBA CBS syllabus (Introduced in 2016). The College shall conduct the examinations of odd semesters whereas the University shall conduct the examination of even semester courses for **five** more consecutive examinations after the new scheme of examination is introduced as per following table:

The students are required to clear all their papers within the stipulated time. The students clearing all the papers of the old scheme of Examination (BBA CBS Syllabus Introduced in 2016) shall be awarded a Degree according to the old scheme of Examination. But the students who failed to clear their course/s in 5 consecutive attempts as per this clause, will be absorbed in the scheme of examination under this direction as per following guidelines:

- A. The candidates who have cleared BBA 1st year (Semester I and II) of the old course (CBS Pattern Introduced in 2016) examination shall be eligible for admission to BBA 2nd Year of the new course (CBCS) but in such case the student will have to clear all those subjects (BBA Sem I and II) which were not included in the previous CBS syllabus (introduced in 2016) but are part of new syllabus.
- **B.** The candidates who have cleared BBA 2nd year (Semester I to IV) of the old course (CBS Pattern Introduced in 2016) examination shall be eligible for admission to BBA 3rd Year of the new course (CBCS) but in such case the student will have to clear all those subjects (BBA Sem I, II, III and IV) which were not included in the previous CBS syllabus (introduced in 2016) but are part of new syllabus.

II. CLARIFICATION ON ABSORPTION SCHEME

The absorption of students of previous CBS course (Introduced in 2016) referred above shall be made to the new course in the following manner:

Situation I: A student had completed 1st year of BBA as per CBS syllabus (introduced in 2016) but due to some reasons the student is dropped out for subsequent years of the previous syllabus (BBA CBS Syllabus)

A student who has passed all courses of BBA 1st year CBS Pattern Programme (Introduced in 2016), shall be admitted to BBA 2nd Year but he/ she must complete those courses which are not considered to be equivalent with the previous CBS pattern examination. In such a case a student will be required to take nominal admission to BBA 1st year under this new direction by paying Rs. 500 and will fill and submit the exam form of BBA 1st and/or 2nd Semester of the new syllabus (as per this direction) for those courses only which are not considered to be equivalent courses with old syllabus (BBA CBS syllabus). The student will also be allowed to fill and submit the regular exam form semester III.

Situation II: A students has not completed 1st year of BBA as per CBS syllabus (introduced in 2016) but have cleared few of the courses of 1st year and is dropped out for subsequent years of the previous syllabus (BBA CBS Syllabus)

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A student who has cleared 4 or more courses of BBA CBS syllabus (introduced in 2016) and has backlogs in remaining courses will be allowed to take admission into 2nd year of BBA under this direction, but he/she must complete those courses which are not considered to be equivalent with the previous CBS pattern examination. In such a case a student will be required to take nominal admission to BBA 1st year under this new direction by paying Rs. 500 and will fill and submit the exam form of BBA 1st and/or 2nd Semester of the new syllabus (as per this direction) for those courses only which are not considered to be equivalent courses with old syllabus (BBA CBS syllabus). The student will also be allowed to fill and submit the regular exam form semester III.

A student who has backlog in 5 or more courses of BBA CBS syllabus (introduced in 2016). In such a case a student will not be eligible for admission to BBA 2nd year and will be required to take nominal admission to BBA 1st year under this new direction by paying Rs. 500 and will fill and submit the exam form of BBA 1st and/or 2nd Semester of the new syllabus (as per this direction) for those courses only which are not considered to be equivalent courses with old syllabus (BBA CBS syllabus). The student will be able to take admission in 2nd year after successful completion of BBA 1st year under this new syllabus.

Situation III: A students has completed 2nd year of BBA as per CBS syllabus (introduced in 2016) and have cleared all the courses of 2nd Year and is drop out for subsequent years of the previous syllabus (BBA CBS Syllabus)

A student who has passed all courses of BBA 1st year and 2nd year under CBS Pattern Syllabus (Introduced in 2016), shall be admitted to BBA 3rd Year but he/she must complete those courses which are not considered to be equivalent with the previous CBS pattern examination. In such a case a student will be required to take nominal admission to BBA 1st and 2nd year under this new direction by paying Rs. 500 for each year and will fill and submit the exam form of BBA 1st to 4th semester of the new syllabus (as per this direction) for those courses only which are not considered to be equivalent courses with old syllabus (BBA CBS syllabus). The student will also be allowed to fill and submit the regular exam form semester V.

Situation IV: A students has not completed 2nd year of BBA as per CBS syllabus (introduced in 2016) but have cleared few of the courses of 2nd Year and is drop out for subsequent years of the previous syllabus (BBA CBS Syllabus)

A student who has passed 4 or more courses of BBA 2nd year under CBS Pattern Syllabus (Introduced in 2016) and has backlogs for remaining courses, shall be admitted to BBA 3rd Year but he/she must complete those courses which are not considered to be equivalent with the previous CBS pattern examination. In such a case a student will be required to take nominal admission to BBA 1st and 2nd year under this new direction by paying Rs. 500 for each year and will fill and submit the exam form of BBA 1st to 4th semester of the new syllabus (as per this direction) for those courses only which are not considered to be equivalent courses with old syllabus (BBA CBS syllabus). The student will also be allowed to fill and submit the regular exam form semester V.

A student has backlogs in 5 or more courses of BBA 2nd year under CBS Pattern Syllabus (Introduced in 2016) and has cleared the remaining courses. In such a

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case a student will be required to take nominal admission to BBA 1st and 2nd year under this new direction by paying Rs. 500 for each year and will fill and submit the exam form of BBA 1st to 4th semester of the new syllabus (as per this direction) for those courses only which are not considered to be equivalent courses with old syllabus (BBA CBS syllabus). Such student shall be admitted to BBA 3rd Year only after successful completion of those courses which are not considered to be equivalent with the previous CBS pattern examination.

III. Equivalence of Subjects

The equivalence & eligibility for exemption of subjects for the students absorbed in the new course shall be as follows:

The above absorption scheme of B.B.A. shall be effective till the introduction of new Syllabus.

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19. Guidelines for Project Work:

A. Objective

A Batch of maximum 4 students will be assigned a project in the 6th Semester of BBA and it will be pursued by them under the supervision of an internal supervisor. The objective of the Project Work is to help the students to develop their ability to apply multi-disciplinary concepts, tools and techniques to solve organizational problems and/or to evolve new/innovative theoretical framework.

B. Type of Project

The Project may take any one of the following forms:

- i) Comprehensive case study (covering single organization/multifunctional area problem, formulation, analysis, and recommendations)
- ii) Inter-organizational study aimed at inter-organizational comparison/validation of theory/survey of management services.
- iii) Evolution of any new conceptual / theoretical framework.
- iv) Field study (Empirical study).
- v) Software analysis, Design, and solutions for organizational achievement (Applicable to IT)

C. Selection of Project Topic:

- Project topic must be selected with respect to the programme of study and area selected by the student.
- Title of the project should clearly specify the objective and scope of the study. It should be specific and neither too vague nor centralistic. The topics should be designed meticulously. It can be designed like "Employee Welfare Measures" A case study of XYZ Ltd.
- Project selection must be made in consultation with the supervisor who will act as a Project guide for the student.

D. Scope of Work

The student is expected to carry out following activities in the project:

- 1. Prepare a synopsis and get it approved by the supervisor as assigned by the respective Institutes.
- 2. Undertake a detailed literature survey on the subject matter.
- 3. Make relevant data collection/observation.
- 4. Consult experts in the field.
- 5. Visit related organizations/institutions/industries.
- 6. Compile data in proper format.
- 7. Make proper conclusions/recommendations.
- 8. Prepare a Project Report.
- 9. The volume of the project-report should be ranging from 60-80 pages.
- 10. Obtain approval of Project Report by project supervisor.
- 11. Submit ONE hard bound copies of the Project Report at the Institute.
- 12. Submission of the Project Report shall be one month prior to the date of the commencement of the 6th Semester Examinations for BBA.

E. General Format of the Report

The project report should preferably be written in the following format:

- a) Executive Summary
- b) Introduction to topic

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- c) Research Methodology
- d) Analysis and Findings of the study
- e) Conclusions and Recommendations of the study
- f) Bibliography
- g) Appendices to include questionnaire if any

F. Examination and Evaluation

The Project is to be treated as a paper of study of the BBA-6th Semester comprising 200 marks. The external assessment shall be done based on the project report and Viva Voce. The Project shall be evaluated by an External examiner for 150 marks and of which 100 marks will be allocated to the Written Report Content and Presentation and 50 marks for Viva Voce. The Project work shall be evaluated by internal and external examiners for 100 marks (as mentioned above) at the respective institute / college as per the schedule fixed by the university. One such External Examiner shall not examine more than 20 Projects (groups) in one academic year.

20. Provision for Multiple Exit

The BBA program offered under this direction provides an opportunity to students for multiple exits from the program as per following conditions:

- a. A student can exit the program after successful completion of 1st and 2nd Semester courses and obtaining 40 credits. Such a student is eligible to be awarded 'Certificate in Business Administration' by the University.
- b. A student can exit the program after successful completion of 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th Semester courses and obtaining 80 credits. Such a student is eligible to be awarded 'Diploma in Business Administration' by the University.
- c. A student who has completed the 3 years program and earned 120 credits will be considered eligible for award of 'Bachelor of Business Administration' degree by the University.
- d. A student who wishes to exit the program before completion of 3 years is required to apply to the university through Principal.
- e. A student who opted for exit from the program before completion of 3 years (a &b) above shall be eligible for admission to next year of the program in any subsequent academic session. However, if at the time of admission, if this scheme of examination is not in force, the student will have to complete the program according to the provisions made under the direction prevailing at the time of such admission.

21. Provision for Transfer of Credits

BBA program offered under this direction provides enhanced academic flexibility to students in terms of selecting the courses they want to learn. A student can opt for any course from any statutory/recognized University or any recognized online learning platform such as SWAYAM/NPTEL in lieu of a course (except Core Course and Discipline Specific Electives) mentioned in this scheme of examination. Similarly, a student can opt for transfer of credits by successfully completing the course recognized by the 'Department of Lifelong learning & Extension' of Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University. The mechanism for transfer of credits earned through these courses to be adhered is mentioned here:

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- i. A student seeking for facility for transfer of credits earned from any other platform will have to mandatorily open an account with 'Academic Bank of Credits' and upload the credits so earned therein.
- ii. Any Core Course or Discipline Specific Elective mentioned in this scheme of examination cannot be opted out by a student.
- iii. A student can opt out any course other than Core Course/Discipline Specific Elective and earn equal number of credits by completing any ODL or Online course/s from any statutory/recognized University or any recognized online learning platform such as SWAYAM/NPTEL.
- iv. A student can opt out any course other than Core Course/Discipline Specific Elective and earn equal number of credits by successfully completing the course recognized by the 'Department of Lifelong learning & Extension' of Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University.
- v. If a student is willing to opt out any such course, he/she will have to mention this while submitting the examination form to the University for respective semester.
- vi. A certificate of completion of such an ODL/Online course shall be submitted by the student to the University through college before end term evaluation.
- vii. Such a certificate shall mandatorily have the number of credits, duration of the course and grades/marks obtained by the student and shall preferably have a QR code for verification.
- viii. The college shall submit the grades / marks obtained by the student to the University along with Internal Assessment marks for the concerned examination.
 - ix. If a student has opted for an ODL/Online course in a particular semester and failed to submit the certificate within prescribed time, the student will be marked for 'Absent' for a particular course in that examination. Such a student will be required to fill in the examination form in the consecutive attempt and submit the passing certificate to get his/her corrected result.
 - x. The procedure for transfer of credits mentioned under this direction is subject to the guidelines issued by the University in this regard and a separate direction for the same shall be issued by the University.

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22. Eligibility for award of Degree:

To become eligible for award of 'Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA)' degree, a student must fulfil the following conditions:

- a. A student must earn minimum 120 credits in not less than 3 years.
- b. A student must successfully complete (pass) all Core Courses and Discipline Specific Electives mentioned in this direction.
- 23. This direction shall come into force phase wise from the academic session 2022-23
- 24. If any question of interpretation of any clause arises for this Direction & Appendix I & II the same shall be referred to the Dean, Faculty of Commerce and Management, whose decision shall be final and binding on all concerned.







Whereas, Maharashtra Public Universities Act 2016(VI of 2017)(hereinafter the Act) has come into force from 1st March, 2017;

AND

Whereas, the University has issued Direction to 27 of 2022 dealing with composition of the four faculties created by the Act, where under the earlier different faculties of the University have been merged into the four new faculties created by the Act, by which the subject of Business Administration has been included in the faculty of Commerce and Management;

AND

AND

Whereas, MHRD, New Delhi & UGC issued the guidelines for implementation of NEP 2020 in all universities in UG & PG programs from academic session 2022-23. So it is necessary to restructure the complete scheme of examination incorporating curriculum features as mentioned in NEP 2020.

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AND

Whereas, the Faculty of Commerce and Management in its meeting dated 24.6.22 has recommended to restructure the BCCA programme so as to meet the expectations of new National Education Policy 2020, certain changes were also suggested by the Faculty, it was also resolve to empower the Hon'ble Vice Chancellor to accept the scheme once prepared and accepted by the Board of Studies for Business Management, on behalf of the Faculty of Commerce and Management;

AND

Whereas, the Academic Council in its meeting held on 8.7. 2022 vide item No. 23 has considered, accepted the recommendation of Faculty of Commerce and Management whereby authorized the Vice Chancellor to accept the Scheme of Examination and syllabi prepared by the Board of Studies in Business Management for the programme of Bachelor of Business Management in order to give effect to the provisions of National Education Policy 2020;

AND

Whereas, the Board of Studies in its meeting dated 19.7.22 has accepted the detailed scheme of examination and syllabus for the Bachelor of Business management with the option of award of Certificate and Diploma in between if the student so desires, as per the new National education Policy as prepared by the sub-committee with minor changes, the said programme is to commence from academic year 2022-23;

AND

Whereas, the Vice Chancellor has granted approval to the scheme of examination so prepared and accepted by the Board of Studies on behalf of the Faculty of Commerce and Management and the Academic Council as resolved by the Faculty of Commerce and Management and the Academic Council in their meetings dated 24.6.22 and 8.7.22 respectively;

AND

Whereas, the Direction No. 5 of 2020 entitled "DIRECTION GOVERNING THE EXAMINATION LEADING TO THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF COMMERCE (COMPUTER APPLICATION) (BCCA) (CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM) (FACULTY OF COMMERCE AND MANAGEMENT)" has lapsed by virtue of proviso to subsection (8) of section 12 of the Act as the said Direction could not be converted in to an Ordinance within the prescribed time and since Ordinance making is a time consuming process and there is an urgency

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to regularized the admissions and examinations of BACHELOR OF COMMERCE (COMPUTER APPLICATION) (BCCA) (OUTCOME BASED)(CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM);

Now, therefore, I, **Dr. Subhash R. Chaudhari, Vice-Chancellor** Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur, in exercise of powers conferred upon me under provision of section 12(8) of the Maharashtra Public Universities Act, 2016, do hereby issue following Directions;

- 1. This Direction may be called 'ADMISSIONS AND EXAMINATIONS LEADING TO THE AWARD OF THE CERTIFICATE, DIPLOMA OR DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF COMMERCE (COMPUTER APPLICATION) (BCCA) (OUTCOME BASED) (CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM), DIRECTION, 2022
- 2. This Direction shall be made applicable from academic session 2022-23.
- 3. INTERPRETATION CLAUSE: In this Direction, unless the context requires otherwise the words, phrases and abbreviations shall have following meaning;
 - a. "Academic Council" means Academic Council of R.T.M. Nagpur University.
 - **b.** "ATKT" refers to allowed to keep term in higher semester.
 - **c. "Board of Studies"** means Board of Studies for various subjects of commerce in the faculty of Commerce and Management in the University.
 - d. "Competent Authority" (for admission purpose) means an "Authority" established or assigned the duty to regulate admissions in the course by the Government of Maharashtra or an authority constituted by the University, for this purpose.
 - e. "Credit Points" refer to the product of No. of credits multiplied by the Grade Point for a given course/paper.
 - f. "Credit" (C) for a course is dependent on the number of hours of instruction per week in that course, and is obtained by using a multiplier of one (1) for lecture and a multiplier of half (1/2) for practical (laboratory) hours.
 - **g.** "Course" means a paper/subject (theory or practical) prescribed for any semester of the programme.

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- h. "Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)" refers to the Cumulative Grade Point Average weighted across all semesters (4 semesters)
- i. "Degree" means the Under Graduate Degree awarded after successful completion of the programme governed by this Direction.
- **j. "Fees"** means the fees prescribed by the University/ Shikshan Shulka Samiti of Government of Maharashtra, for the Under Graduate programme under this Direction, from time to time.
- **k.** "Grade letter" is an index to indicate the performance of a student in a particular course (Paper). It is the transformation of actual marks secured by a student in a course/paper. Grade letters are O, A, B, C, P, F and AB.
- "Grade Point" is the weightage allotted to each grade letter depending on the range of marks awarded in a course/paper.
- m. "Graduate programme" means Bachelors' degree programme in Commerce (Computer Application).
- n. "Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA)" refers to the performance of the student in a given semester. SGPA is based on the total credit points earned by the student in all the courses and the total number of credits assigned to the courses/papers in a Semester.
- **o.** "Student" means student admitted to Bachelor's degree programme in commerce under this direction.
- p. "University" means Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University.
- **4. THE DURATION OF THE PROGRAMME:** There shall be Six Examinations leading to the degree of Bachelor of Commerce (Computer Application) (BCCA) namely:
 - The Bachelor of Commerce (Computer Application) (BCCA) 1st Semester Examination,
 - The Bachelor of Commerce (Computer Application) (BCCA) 2ND Semester Examination,
 - The Bachelor of Commerce (Computer Application) (BCCA) 3RD Semester Examination,
 - The Bachelor of Commerce (Computer Application) (BCCA) 4th Semester Examination,
 - The Bachelor of Commerce (Computer Application) (BCCA) 5th Semester Examination,
 - The Bachelor of Commerce (Computer Application) (BCCA) 6th Semester Examination,

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- 5. The duration of the Degree Course under this shall be of three academic years divided into six semesters with the BCCA 1st and 2nd Semester Examinations during the first academic year, the BCCA 3rd and 4th Semester Examinations during the second year and the BCCA 5th and 6th Semester Examinations during the third year.
- **6.** The examinations specified in paragraph 4 above shall be held twice a year at such places and on such dates as may be fixed by the University.

7. ELIGIBILITY FOR ADMISSION:

- **a.** Subject to the provisions of general ordinances of the university regarding admissions in various courses of the university, including reservation of seats, an applicant for admission to this programme, governed by this Direction, shall have passed
 - i. XII Standard Examination of the Maharashtra State Board of Secondary and Higher Secondary Education, with English at Higher or Lower level and any Modern Indian Language at higher or lower level with any combination of optional subjects;

OR

ii. XII Standard Examination of Maharashtra State Board of Secondary and Higher Secondary Education in Vocational Stream with one language only, or any other examination recognized as equivalent thereto; in such subjects and with such standards of attainments as may be prescribed to be Minimum Competency Vocation Course(MCVC) by the competent authority.

OR

iii. Any other Equivalent Examination of any other State Board, Central Board or International Board in 10+2 pattern and any combination of other subjects.

OR

iv. Any equivalent Qualification from any foreign country recognized by the university.

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b. No person shall be admitted to this Program, if he has already passed the same Program or a Program of any other statutory University, which has been recognized as equivalent to this program.

c. A student admitted to the program under this Direction shall not be allowed to join any other program in this University or any other University simultaneously. Any violation of this condition will amount to an unfair practice and shall be actionable as per the relevant rules of the university.

8. THE STRUCTURE OF THE PROGRAMME:

The BACHELOR OF COMMERCE (COMPUTER APPLICATION) (B.C.C.A.) OUTCOME BASED & CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM (OB & CBCS) programme shall consist of Six Semesters. The number of courses in each semester, the maximum marks and the credits for each course and the minimum passing marks for each course as mentioned in teaching and Examination Scheme, absorption scheme in respective semesters shall be as detailed in APPENDIX- I appended to this Direction. Detail syllabus & paper pattern is enclosed in APPENDIX-II.

- ✓ For all Theory Papers there shall be FIVE Periods Per week per Subject of 48 Minutes duration each. Each Theory Paper must cover minimum 60 Clock Hours (*60 LECTURES OF 48 MINS EACH) of Teaching in each semester.
- ✓ The college shall offer the subjects of any particular optional subject only if 40 or more students are opting for the particular subject.
- ✓ The fees for the programme and the University examinations shall be as prescribed by the University from time to time.

9. RULES OF EXAMINATION:

- a) The Examinations for Semesters I, II, III, IV, V and VI shall be held twice a year. The university examinations shall be held at such places and on such dates as may be notified by the University. The I, III & V Semester examinations shall be conducted at college level as per University directives & schedule.
- b) The passing heads in respect of all the courses, including languages, shall consist of the university theory examination and internal assessment marks taken together.
- c) In order to pass any subject (course) a student must secure not less than 40 % of the maximum marks prescribed for that course, i.e. to say, out of total 100 marks (80 for university examination and 20 for internal assessment), the student must have obtained minimum 40 marks together in the university examination and internal assessment.
- d) The results of successful candidates at the end of semester-VI shall be classified on the basis of aggregate marks obtained in all the six semesters.

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- e) The candidates who pass all the semester examinations in the first attempt and have completed program in minimum prescribed period for the program, shall only be eligible for ranks.
- f) The results of the candidates who have passed the Semester-VI examination but not passed the lower semester examinations shall be declared as NCL (not completed lower semester examinations). Such candidates shall be eligible for the Degree only after successful completion of all the lower semester examinations.
- g) An unsuccessful examinee at any end semester examination shall be eligible for reexamination on the payment of a fresh Examination fees prescribed by the University.
- h) As examinee who has successfully passed the examination of all the semesters shall, on payment of the prescribed fees be entitled to receive a Degree of Bachelor of Commerce (Computer Application) in the prescribed format signed by the Vice-Chancellor.
- i) The provisions of Ordinance No. 3 of 2007 for the award of grace marks for passing an examination, securing higher grade in subject(s) as updated from time to time shall apply to the examination under this Direction.
- j) University guidelines & direction updated from time to time regarding Improvement of results, Reassessment/Revaluation and Incentive Marks shall be applicable to BCCA program governed by this direction.

NOTE:

- I. A student has to compulsorily complete all core courses (15) of 1st, 2nd, & 3rd year with total 60 credits to be eligible to obtain the degree. Students also will have to compulsorily complete DSE (Discipline Specific Elective) of 8 credits.
- II. Students may opt for ODL (Online Distance Learning) in place of AE/SE/GE courses across semesters accumulating equal number of credits in order to substitute any course. (ODL certificate specifying credits is mandatorily to be submitted)
- III. Students opting for ODL in place of AE/SE/GE courses across semesters will have to bear expenses incurred for ODL course fee & Examination fee if any.
- IV. Provision for Multiple Exit:

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The BCCA program offered under this direction provides an opportunity to students for multiple exits from the program as per following conditions:

- a. A student can exit the program after successful completion of 1st and 2nd Semester courses and obtaining 40 credits. Such a student is eligible to be awarded 'Certificate in Commercial Computer Application' by the University.
- b. A student can exit the program after successful completion of 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th Semester courses and obtaining 80 credits. Such a student is eligible to be awarded 'Diploma in Commercial Computer Application' by the University.
- c. A student who has completed the 3 years' program and earned 120 credits will be considered eligible for award of 'Bachelor of Commerce (Computer Application)' degree by the University.
- **d.** A student who wishes to exit the program before completion of 3 years is required to apply to the university through Principal.
- e. A student who opted for exit from the program before completion of 3 years (a & b) above shall be eligible for admission to next year of the program in any subsequent academic session. However, if at the time of admission, if this scheme of examination is not in force, the student will have to complete the program according to the provisions made under the direction prevailing at the time of such admission.

V. Provision for Transfer of Credits

BCCA program offered under this direction provides enhanced academic flexibility to students in terms of selecting the courses they want to learn. A student can opt for any course from any statutory/recognized University or any recognized online learning platform such as SWAYAM/NPTEL in lieu of a course (except Core Course and Discipline Specific Electives) mentioned in this scheme of examination. Similarly, a student can opt for transfer of credits by successfully completing the course recognized by the 'Department of Lifelong learning & Extension' of Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University. The mechanism for transfer of credits earned through these courses to be adhered is mentioned here:

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- ✓ A student seeking for facility for transfer of credits earned from any other platform will have to mandatorily open an account with 'Academic Bank of Credits' and upload the credits so earned therein.
- ✓ Any Core Course or Discipline Specific Elective mentioned in this scheme of examination cannot be opted out by a student.
- ✓ A student can opt out any course other than Core Course/Discipline Specific Elective and earn equal number of credits by completing any ODL or Online course/s from any statutory/recognized University or any recognized online learning platform such as SWAYAM/NPTEL.
- ✓ A student can opt out any course other than Core Course/Discipline Specific Elective and earn equal number of credits by successfully completing the course recognized by the 'Department of Lifelong learning & Extension' of Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University.
- ✓ If a student is willing to opt out any such course, he/she will have to mention this while submitting the examination form to the University for respective semester.
- ✓ A certificate of completion of such an ODL/Online course shall be submitted by the student to the University through college before end term evaluation.
- ✓ Such a certificate shall mandatorily have the number of credits, duration of the course and grades/marks obtained by the student and shall preferably have a QR code for verification.
- ✓ The college shall submit the grades and marks obtained by the student to the University along with Internal Assessment marks for the concerned examination.
- ✓ If a student has opted for an ODL/Online course in a particular semester and failed to submit the certificate within prescribed time, the student will be marked for 'Absent' for a particular course in that examination. Such a student will be required to fill in the examination form in the consecutive attempt and submit the passing certificate to get his/her corrected result.

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9. ASSESSMENT

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- The final total assessment of the candidates is made in terms of a Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) and an external assessment for each course/subject taken together.
- For each paper (other than Practical, Internship and Project), 20 marks will be Continuous Internal Evaluation and 80 marks for semester end examination to be conducted at college level (Odd semesters examinations) and RTM Nagpur University level (Even semester examinations)

- Each subject teacher must circulate the list of minimum 5 activities/practicals of field assignment/mini project/market surveys/research papers & research/live projects etc (May be executed in group of 4 students maximum) at the beginning of course and evaluate the same for 10 marks as per 1c above.
- There shall be no separate / extra allotment of workload to the concerned teacher.
 He/ She shall conduct the CIE activity during the regular teaching days / periods as a part of regular teaching activity.

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- The internal marks will be communicated to the University at the end of each semester, but before the semester end examinations / as instructed by university. These marks will be considered for the declaration of the results.
- The record of internal marks, evaluation & result should be maintained for a period of one year by respective institute/college for verification by competent authority.

(B) Assessment of Semester VI Project -

- ✓ Project Work may include CSS/JAVA Script, Website/Web page, Mobile app, Advance Excel & Dashboard, PHP My SQL, Python, Data Visualization, Java, Android Programing, WordPress & .NET technologies etc.
- ✓ *Project based on any application development platform/programing language
 which a student might have learnt in ODL is also allowed.
- ✓ *Project to be executed in group of Maximum 4 students.

 For Project work, guide /supervisor must be allotted by the Institute. The Guide/
 Supervisor shall act as an internal examiner for project Examination and award marks
 to individual students in these groups at the time of demonstration/ Presentation and
 Viva-voce.
 - a. The guide or the supervisor shall be appointed by the Principal of college and should be full time approved faculty to BCCA/ MCM Programme.
 - b. The External examiner shall be appointed from the list of full-time approved teaching faculty of the BCCA/ MCM program by the University.
 - Each such External examiner shall examine and award marks to individual students in these groups.
 - d. One copy of Project work report (Printed & Hard Bound) shall be submitted to the College/Department, at least One Month prior to the date of commencement of Semester-VI Examination for evaluation purpose. The College shall retain the copy of Project Work.
 - e. A Candidate shall submit with his/her/their project work, a certificate from the Supervisor to the effect:

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That the candidate has satisfactorily completed the Project work for not less than one session and

That the Project work is the result of the candidates own work and is of sufficiently high standard to warrant its presentation for examination (As per Format in Appendix -I).

Candidate shall submit his/her/their declaration that the Project is the result of his own research work and the same has not been previously submitted to any examination of this University or any other University. (As per Format in Appendix – I). The Project shall be liable to be rejected and /or cancelled if found otherwise.

- f. The Project work shall be evaluated through demonstration and Viva-voce at the College/ Department center before Semester VI examination.
- g. A student appearing for BCCA Semester VI Examination will have to pay additional fees for evaluation of project as prescribed by the University from time to time.

(C) Assessment of Practical -

- i. Practical exam shall be of 4 hours' duration.
- ii. A Student is expected to complete the Practical Assignments based on Syllabus of Practical (As per practical list given in Appendix II) and submit the same in the form of a files (Practical assignment Record) at the end of Academic Session for the evaluation purpose.
- iii. The Practical Record of every student shall carry a certificate as shown in Appendix -I, duly signed by the teacher-in-charge and the Head of the

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Department.

- iv. If the student fails to submit his / her certified Practical Record duly signed by the Teacher-In-Charge and the Head of the Department, he / she shall not be allowed to appear for the Practical Examination and no Marks shall be allotted to the student.
- v. After Viva-Voice and evaluation of practical records of a student by the Internal & External Examiner, both examiners should sign on the certificate of practical records.
- vi. The Internal Examiner shall be appointed by the Principal of college/institute and should be full time approved faculty to BCCA/ MCM Programme.

The External examiner shall be appointed from the list of full-time approved teaching faculty of the BCCA/ MCM program by the University.

For practical examination of **odd semesters** to be conducted at college level, the internal & external examiners shall be appointed by Principal at college level. For practical examination of **Even semesters** to be conducted at university level, the external examiners shall be appointed by university.

(D) Internships and its evaluation

At the end of fourth semester, all students will have to undergo internship which may be a Field Survey/ Research Projects of 4-6 weeks (Minimum 120 hours) with an industrial, business, service, or social organization by taking a project study. The condition of successfully completing the program shall not be deemed to have been satisfied unless a student undergoes **Internship** training under the supervision of the department in organizations as approved by the Director/ Principal/ Head / Faculty from time to time. Alternatively, the Director/ Principal/ Head / Faculty of the Department/ College/ Institute may allocate the sector/ industry/ company specific project to the individual student. Each student will be required to submit an **Internship** project report to the Department/ College/ Institute for the work undertaken during this period within three weeks of commencement of the **FIFTH** semester for the purpose of evaluation in the Fifth semester. The evaluation will be of 100 marks. The evaluation will be internal at college level. The detailed parameters for evaluation of Internship will be provided by the colleges at the time of its assessment and evaluation.

The scope of the subjects, pattern of examination & list of Practical Programs / Problems / questions shall be as indicated in the Appendix – II.

The Medium of instructions and examinations shall be in ENGLISH only.

The Maximum/minimum marks which each subject carries & workload in BCCA 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th Semester Examination shall be as indicated in Examination & Teaching Scheme (item no 7).

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10. CREDIT AND GRADE POINT SYSTEM

APPENDIX-II

I. GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

The scope of the subject, percentage of passing in theory and project will be governed as per following rules:

- In order to pass at the Semester I, II, III & IV examinations an examinee shall obtain not less than 40% marks in each paper. This is to say that out of total 100 marks student should score 40 marks jointly in university examination (80 Marks) and internal examination (20 marks) except in project of IV Semester. The examinee shall have to obtain minimum 40 marks out of 100 in evaluation of project and 50% (200 out of 400 Marks) aggregate in each Semester wise End Examination.
- The results of successful candidates at the end of semester-IV shall be classified on the basis of aggregate marks obtained in all the four semesters.
- The candidates who pass all the semester examinations in the first attempt are eligible for ranks.
- The results of the candidates who have passed the Semester-IV examination but not passed the lower semester examinations shall be declared as NCL (not completed lower semester examinations). Such candidates shall be eligible for the Degree only after successful completion of all the lower semester examinations.
- Percentage of marks for declaring class:
 Distinction-75%(and above.

 First Class- 60% and above but less than 75%. Second Class- 50% and above but less than 60%.
- An unsuccessful examinee at the any semester wise end examination shall be eligible for reexamination on payment of a fresh Examination fee prescribed by the University.

II.TEACHING NORMS FOR THEORY PAPERS AND PROJECT:

- .For all Theory Papers there shall be **FOUR Periods Per week per Subject of One Hourduration** each. Each Theory Paper must cover minimum 60 Clock Hours of Teaching and 240Clock Hours per Semester for all the 4 Papers. One Credit subject of Theory will be of 1 Clock Hour per week of 25 marks running for 15 weeks and 4 Credit Course of Theory will be of 4 Clock Hours per week of 100 Marks running for 15 weeks.
- For Project work/Research work a batch of Maximum 20 students per guide /supervisor has to be allotted by the College/ University Department. FOUR periods per week of one hour duration shall be the work load allotted for project guidance for 20 students.
- The Project guide /supervisor must possess M.Phil. or Ph.D. degree of Faculty of Commerce or should be a Full time approved Teacher
- No person shall be admitted to this Programme, if he has already passed the same Programme or an Programme of any other statutory University (which has been recognized as equivalent to this programme.)
- A candidate who fails in any of the semester examinations may be permitted to take the
 examinations again at a subsequent appearance as per the syllabus and scheme of examination in
 vogue at the time the candidate took the examination for the first time. This facility shall be limited
 to the following two years.
- Examinee successful at the Semester I, II, III and IV examinations shall, on payment of the prescribed fee, receive a Degree in the prescribed form signed by the Vice-Chancellor.
- Qualification of Teacher shall be as per U.G.C. and State Government norms.

II. CONVERSION OF MARKS TO GRADES AND CALCULATIONS OF GPA (GRADE POINT AVERAGE) AND CGPA (CUMULATIVE GRADE POINT AVERAGE):

In the Credit and Grade Point System, the assessment of individual Subjects in the concerned examinations will be on the basis of marks only, but the marks shall later be converted into Grades by some mechanism wherein the overall performance of the Learners can be reflected after considering the Credit Points for any given course. However, the overall evaluation shall be designated in terms of Grade. There are some abbreviations used here that need understanding of each and every parameter involved in grade computation and the evaluation mechanism. The abbreviations and formulae used are as follows:-

Abbreviations and Formulae Used

G: Grade

GP: Grade Points

C : Credits

CP: Credit Points

CG: Credits X Grades (Product of credits & Grades)

SGPA = Σ CG: Sum of Product of Credits & Grades points / Σ C: Sum of Credits points

SGPA: Semester Grade Point Average shall be calculated for individual semesters. (It is also designated as GPA)

CGPA : Cumulative Grade Point Average shall be calculated for the entire Programme by considering all the semesters taken together.

While calculating the CG the value of Grade Point 1 shall be consider Zero (0) in case of learners who failed in the concerned course/s i.e. obtained the marks below 40. After calculating the SGPA for an individual semester and the CGPA for entire programme, the value can be matched with the grade in the Grade Point table as per the Five (05) Points Grading System and expressed as a single designated GRADE such as O,A,B,C,, F.(Fail).

Note: -

- Consider Grade Points equal to Zero for (C x G) calculations of failed Learner/s in the concerned course/s.
- If the learner fails to score 200 out of 400 marks in aggregate then the subjects in which he/she has scored 50 or more marks shall be exempted. He/she shall have to appear for all subjects in which he/she has failed to score 50 or more marks. In such case his/her internal evaluation marks out of 20 shall be retained and he/she shall have to appear for Semester End examination of 80 marks and shall have to score-
 - More than 40% marks including internal marks scored in each of the subject in which he/she has failed to score 50 or more marks.

AND

- He /she shall have to score a total of 200 marks out of 400 in aggregate after adding up of the marks scored in exempted subject/subjects.
- Total marks (Internal + Semester End Examination) obtained by the student shall be converted into Grades and Five Point Grade points as above.

III. REJECTION OF RESULT:

- The candidate shall have an option of being NOT DECLARED SUCCESSFUL in either of the semester end examination if he/she fails to secure minimum 55% aggregate marks in that semester. This option can be opted only through prescribed format forming a part of Examination application form for semester end examination. It shall be applicable only to 80 marks Semester end examination and the internal evaluation marks out of 20 shall not be changed/ altered in any case. If the candidate opts for this option then it shall be irrevocable.
- The candidate who fails in one or more subjects of a semester may be permitted to reject the result of the whole examination of that semester. Rejection of result subject-wise shall not be permitted. A candidate who rejects the results shall appear in the examination of that semester in the subsequent examination.
- Rejection shall be exercised only once in each semester and the rejection once exercised cannot be revoked.
- Application for rejection along with payment of the prescribed fee shall be submitted to the University through the college along with the original statement of marks within 30 days from the date of publication of the result.
- The candidate who rejects the result is eligible for only class and not for ranking.

IV. <u>IMPROVEMENT OF RESULT:</u>:

- The candidate who has passed in all the papers of a semester may be permitted to improve the result by reappearing for the whole examination of that semester.
- The reappearance shall be permitted only once in each semester.
- The reappearance for the examination of any semester is permitted during the subsequent examination of that semester.
- Application for reappearance along with payment of prescribed fee shall be submitted to the University through the college along with the original statement of marks within 30 days from the date of publication of the result.
- The candidate passes in all the subjects in the reappearance, higher of the two aggregate marks secured by the candidate shall be awarded to the candidate for that semester. In ease the candidate fails in the reappearance, candidate shall retain the first appearance result.
- A candidate who has appeared for improvement is eligible for class only and not for ranking.
- Internal assessment marks shall be shown separately in the marks card. A candidate who has rejected the result or who, having failed, takes the examination again or who has appeared for improvement shall retain the internal assessment marks already obtained.

V. GUIDELINES FOR SETTING OUESTION PAPERS:

- The question paper should be set in such a manner so as to cover the complete syllabus as prescribed by the University.
- .The numerical questions in any of the subjects shall be set in ENGLISH only and the candidate shall have to answer such questions in ENGLISH only. The candidate may answer nonnumerical questions in ENGLISH, MARATHI or HINDI.
- The duration of the Semester wise End Examination shall be 3.00 Hours per course.
- The Question paper for all subjects of all semesters except Project of semester IV shall comprise of 5 Questions of 16 marks each.
- The internal evaluation of all subjects shall be done at College/ Department by the respective subject teacher.

Sc. Semester-I to IV (Semester I to VI for M. Sc. (Tech) Applied Geology) with draft direction and other details.

Whereas, the Academic Council in as meeting held on considered, accepted and recommended to Management Council, for M.Se, along with draft

Whereas, the Management Council in its meeting held on considered, accepted the draft direction and other details, vide sem No. . . bas

Whereas, the new draft direction and scheme of examination as per somester pattern is to be implemented from the Academic Session 2015-16 for M.Sc. semester I and onwards which is to be regulated by this direction and as such there is no existence and framing of an Ordinance for the above examination is a time consuming process.

Whereas, the admission of students in the Choice Based Credit System at M.Sc. Semester I and onwards are to be made in the Academic Session 2015-16.

Whereas, ordinance making is a time consuming process, therefore, L. Dr. S. P. Kane, Vice Chancellor Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur in exercise of powers vested under Section 14(8) of the Act do hereby issue the following Direction.

- 1. This Direction may be called 'Direction relating to examinations leading to the Degree of Master of Science, Semester Pattern (Choice Bosed Credit System) and Degree of Master of Science and Technology (Applied Geology), Sentester Pattern, (Choice Hased Credit System)
- 2. The direction shall come into force from the date of its issue by Hon'ble Vice Chancelor and shall remain in force till the relevan ordinance comes into being in accordance with the provisions of the Act.
- 3. The duration of the M. Sc. course shall be of two academic years consisting of four semesters with the University examinations at the end of each sensester namely.

General Rules and Regulations regarding pattern of question paper, absorption scheme and choice based credit system:

A) Pattern of Question Paper

1. There will be four units in each paper.

- Maximum marks of each treary paper will be 80 (in M. St. Mathematics, each paper will be of 160 marks)
- Question paper will consist of five questions, each of 16 marks (In M. Sc. Mathematics, each question will be of 26).

4. Four questions will be an four units with internal choice (One question on each unit).

 Fifth question will be compulsory with questions from each of the four units having equal weightage and there will be no internal choice.

B) Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)

M. Se Program shall consist of four semesters, wherein the student has to complete certain number of credits as indicated in Table 1. Each subject (or course) has fixed number of credits. The types of subject subseculs are: Core Core Proct, Core Elective, Core Elective Proct, Foundation Course, Serimar and Project. Review writing.

Among the 100 credits (Applied Gerslopy 150) which candidate recols to complete and clear for M. Sc. m any concerned subjects, at least 52 credits (Mattis 90 / Appl. Geo 140) must be taken from the parent department where he / she is registered for M. Sc. Course. The remaining 18 credits (Maths 10 / Appl. Geo II) can be taken from any other department of university or affiliated oxileges offering financiation osceres of PG programs. Similar is the case with Mathematics and Geology programs with the exception of difference (given in parentheses) in number of condits.

- Core: Major theory papers in the concerned subject.
- Core Elective: These papers will be specialization in the concerned subject. Ex. Zoology MRP, AP, Fisheries, Enternology etc.
- Foundation Course: Student can choose this paper from any other subject other than his main subject for postgraduation. For Ex. An M. Sc. Biochemistry student can take such a foundation course paper from Zoology or Mathematics or Computer Science or Political Science subject.
- Project / Review writing: Project / Review writing is in semester IV (Sem VI in Geology).
- Seminar: The seminar in each semester shall be presented by the candidate in his / her parent idenantment only.

Credits:

It is a unit by which the course work is measured. It determines the number of hours of instructions required per week. One credit is equivalent to one hour of teaching (fecture or tutorial) or two hours of practical work / field work per week.

For example a subject with 6-2-6 (L-T-P) means it has 3 Lectures, 1 Tutorial and 6 Practical in a week. This subject will have ten credits (6x) + 2x/5 + 6x/6 = 100. If a student is declared pass in a subject, then he/she gets the credits associated with that subject. Depending on the marks scored in a subject, student is given a Grade. Each grade has get certain grade points as follows:

New, therefore, I, Dr. Subhash R. Chaudhari, Vice Chancellor, Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, in exercise of my powers under section 12(8) of the Act, do hereby issue the following Direction:

- This Direction shall be called "ADMISSIONS AND EXAMINATIONS LEADING TO THE AWARD OF THE DEGREE OF MASTER OF SCIENCE (HOME SCIENCE) (SEMESTER PATTERN) (CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM), DIRECTION, 2020."
- The direction shall come into force from the date of its issuance.
- In this Direction unless the context requires otherwise;
 - "ATKT" means "Allowed to Keep Term" in the higher semester, as per the rules
 ef the university.
 - Boards of Studies" means Boards of studies of the University in the discipline/subjects concerned.
 - c. "Credit" means the unit by which the course work is measured. It is measured in terms of weekly class hours assigned to a Course.
 - d. "Credit Point" (CP): It is the value obtained by multiplying the Grade Point by the Credit i.e. No. of Credits assigned for the course x Grade Points secured for that course.
 - c. "Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)": CGPA refers to the Cumulative Grade Point Average weighted across all the semesters. It is obtained by dividing total number of credit points in all the semesters by the total number of credits in all the semesters.

- f. "Degree" means Post Graduate Degree in Home Science with respective specialization
- g. "Grade Letter": It is an index to indicate the performance of a student in a particular course/ Paper. It is the transformation of actual marks secured by a student in a course/paper. It is indicated by a Grade Letter O, A+, A, B+, B, C, P and F. There is a range of marks for each Grade.
- b. "Grade Point": Grade Point is weightage allotted to each grade letter depending on the marks awarded in a course/paper.
- "Post Graduate programme" means Master's degree course in the subject of Home

Science in the Faculty of Science and Technology.

- j. "Semester Grade Point Average" (SGPA): SGPA indicates the performance of a student in a given Semester. It is based on the total credit points earned by the student in all the courses and the total number of credits assigned to the courses/papers in a Semester.
- *Student* means student admitted to Post Graduate programmes under this Direction.

- 4. Admission & Eligibility to the Course: Subject to the compliance with the provisions of this Direction and of other Ordinances in force from time to time an applicant for admission to Semester-I examination, for different specialisations shall be as below:

For admission to the M.Sc. Home Science (Food Science and Nutrition) Semester I, a candidate shall have B.Sc. (Home Science), B.Voc. in Food Processing & Engineering /B.Sc. with Postgraduate Diploma in Dietetics, B.Sc. with Nutrition of any other statutory university recognized equivalent thereto. (Preference will be given to B.Sc. Home Science students!)

b) For [M.Sc. (Resource Management) Semester-I]

For admission to the M.Sc. Semester I in Resource Management, a candidate shall have offered B.Sc. (Home Science), M.A. (Home Economies), Bachelor of Interior



Design (BID) of the university or of any other statutory university recognized equivalent thereto.

c) For [M.Sc. (Human Development) Semester -I]

For admission to the M.Sc. Semester I in Human Development, a candidate shall have B.Sc. (Home Science), B.A. and M. A. (Home Economies), M.S.W., M.B.B.S., II A & M.A. (Psychology) and B.A. with Additional Psychology of the university or of any other statutory university recognized equivalent thereto.

d) For [M.Sc. (Textile and Clothing) Semester-I]

For admission to the M.Sc. Semester I in textile and Clothing, B.Sc. (Home Science), Bachelor of Fashion Design, Bachelor of Textile Design of the university, B.Sc. in fashion Technology from Annamalai University or of any other statutory university recognized equivalent thereto.

e) For [M.Sc. Home Science (Extension Education) Semester-I]

For Admission to the M.Sc. Semester I in Home Science Extension a candidate shall have offered B.Sc.(Home science), M.A. (Home Economics), B.S.W B.V.Sc, B.A.(Rural Services), Postgraduate diploma in Mass Communications. B.Sc. (Agriculture) of the university or of any other statutory university recognized equivalent thereto.

- Duration of the Course: The M.Sc. Home Science Course shall be of two academic years consisting of semesters-I and II in the first year and Semesters III and IV in the second year.
- 6. Medium of Instructions: The medium of instructions shall be English. Question papers for the examination shall be set in English only. However, the students of M.Sc. (Human Development), M.Sc. (Textiles and Clothing), and M.Sc. (Home Science Extension Education) will have an option to write their answers either in English, Hindi or Marathi. While in the specialisations of M.Sc. (Food Science & Nutrition) and M.Sc. (Resource Management), students will not have choice to write their answers in any language other than English.
- 7. Course Structure: The number of theory and practical papers/subjects, the maximum marks assigned to each paper with minimum passing marks/grade which an examinee must obtain in order to pass an examination and the Scheme of the examination shall be as prescribed in <u>APPENDIX-I</u> to this direction as follows: Appendix-I-a- for M.Sc. Home Science (Food Science & Nutrition).

Appendix-I-c-for M.Sc. Home Science (Human Development),

Appendix-1-d- M.Sc. Home Science (Textiles & Clothing) and

The guidelines for the students and supervisors regarding Research Project Work Report are given in <u>APPENDIX –III</u>.
- 16. The examinee at each of the examination shall have option of not being declared successful at the examination in case he/she does not secure a minimum of grade equivalent to 55% marks i.e grade "B" at the examination. This option will have to be exercised every time the application is submitted to any of the examinations. Once this option is exercised, the option shall be binding on the examinee and it shall not be revoked under any circumstances.

The successful examinee at the end of fourth semester examination, shall be given Grade Point Average (GPA) and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) as per the APPENDIX-IV and Letter Grades shall be awarded in each semester examination as per the rules and regulations of Choice Based Credit System (Semester Pattern) as prescribed in the said APPENDIX.
- 18. The rules for the award of grace marks framed by the university from time to time, shall apply to the examination under this direction also.
- 19. The names of the successful examinee passing the examination as a whole in the minimum prescribed period, without any additional attempt may be declared/placed in the merit list as per rules of the university prescribed from time to time.

- d. "Credit" means the unit by which the course work is measured. It is measured in terms of weekly class hours assigned to a Course.
- e. "Credit Point" (CP): It is the value obtained by multiplying the Grade Point by the Credit i.e. No. of Credits assigned for the course x Grade Points secured for that course.
- f. "Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)": CGPA refers to the Cumulative Grade Point Average weighted across all the semesters. It is obtained by dividing total number of credit points in all the semesters by the total number of credits in all the semesters.
- g. "Degree" means Master's degree in Fashion Design.



- h. "Grade Letter": It is an index to indicate the performance of a student in a particular course/ Paper. It is the transformation of actual marks secured by a student in a course/paper. It is indicated by a Grade letter O, A, B, C, D, E and F. There is a range of marks for each Grade.
- "Grade Point": Grade Point is weight allotted to each grade letter depending on the murks awarded in a course/paper
- j. "Post Graduate programme" means Master's degree programme in the subject of Fashion Design in the Faculty of Science and Technology.
- k. "Student" means student admitted to Post Graduate programme under this Direction.
- Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA): SGPA indicates the performance of a student
 in a given Semester. It is based on the total credit points earned by the student in all the
 courses and the total number of credits assigned to the courses/papers in a Semester.
- L "University": means Rashtrasant Tukdoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur.

Home Science/Garment Technology/ B.Sc in Fashion Design/BA with Fashion Design /Bachelor of Khadi production design/Bachelor of fashion business management/ B.Voc in Fashion Design or any other equivalent examination from any recognized University in India or abroad or Graduation in Textile Design, Textile Science / Handloom Technology or Equivalent / Graduates in Fashion Accessories, Apparel Merchandising / Graduate in any discipline with one year relevant Garment ,Textile Industry Experience, one or two year Diploma or Certificate Course in Fashion Design, Garment Technology, Fashion Technology/Dress Designing, Dress Making/BFA/MFA (Master of Fine Arts in all discipline) M.A. Home Economics ii) No candidate shall be admitted to an examination under this direction, if he/she has
- No candidate shall be admitted to an examination under this direction, if be/she has already passed the same examination of this university or of any other university.
- Lateral admission- Those Who have done PG Diploma in Fashion Designing or Fashion Technology /Apparel Merchandising or equivalent /M. Se Home Science in



Textile & Clothing or equivalent shall be eligible to take admission in semester III of this programme.

- Duration of the Course: The duration of the Master of Fashion Design course shall be of two academic years consisting of four Semester with University examinations at the end of each semester.
- Medium of Instruction: The medium of instructions shall be English.
 However, the students may write their examinations in either English or Marathi or Hindi languages.
- 8. Course Structure: This programme shall comprise theory papers, internship and Research Project spread in various semesters. The number of papers and maximum marks assigned to each paper and minimum marks/grade, an examinee must obtain in order to pass the examination shall be as prescribed in Appendix-I, appended with this Direction. It shall have one and elective courses as described in the Appendix –I to this Direction.
- 9. Foundation Course/Elective: It refers to those courses which are included in the Appendix- A, of this Direction which a student of this programme and the students of other programmes may opt. In the alternative students of the programme may opt for an elective course prescribed for the students of the third and fourth semesters.
- The scope of the Courses/subjects shall be as prescribed in the syllabus (Appendix -V).

11. Scheme of Examination:

- i) The theory examination of Semester-I, II, III and IV shall be conducted by the University and shall be held separately at the end of each semester at such places and dates as may be decided and notified by the University.
- ii) Research Project and Viva -Voce Examination-The Viva-Voce shall be held at the end of part fourth semester on completion of Research Project for which external examiner shall be appointed for conduction of Viva -Voce on such date as fixed by the university.
- Internship:-The internship of four weeks duration shall be completed before fourth semester examinations, this internship could be done at once or in two parts



- of two weeks each i.e. in the summer vacations after second semester or in winter vacation after third semester examinations. Evaluation of four weeks internship report will be conducted at the college level in semester IV.
- Detail instructions regarding Project Work Scheme, Guidelines for the Students,
 Supervisors and Examiners, Pattern of Question Paper etc. are as given in Appendix
 II
- 12. A.T.K.T. Rules: The failure students of the semester examinations of the programme shall be allowed to take admission in the higher semesters as per the rules below; -

APPENDIX - II

A. Project Work Scheme, Guidelines for the Students, Supervisors and Examiners

Every student is required to carry out Project Work (semester IV) on a related research topic of the subject /course. It must be an original work. On the basis of this work, student must submit the Project Report (typed and properly bound) in two copies at least one month prior to commencement of the final Practical Examination of Semester IV. The project report shall comprise of Introduction, Review of literature and Methodology, Results Discussion, Summary, Conclusions and References along with the declaration by the candidate that the work is original and not submitted to any University or Organization for award of the degree and certificate by the supervisor and forwarded through Head/Course-coordinator/Director of the Department/Centre or the Principal of the College.

The supervisors for the Experimental project work shall be from the following.

A person selected by the duly constituted selection committee in the relevant subject and approved by the University, exclusively for P. G. Course.

OR

A person selected by the duly constituted selection committee of the University approved by the University and appointed as a full time regular teacher with Masters Degree at U. G. Level in the relevant subject and having at least 10 years teaching experience.

OR

A person selected by the duly constituted selection committee of the University approved by the University and appointed as a full time regular teacher with Ph. D. Degree at U. G. Level in the relevant subject and having at least 5 years teaching experience.

B. General Rules and Regulations

Pattern of Question Paper

- 1. There will be four units in each paper.
- 2. Question paper will consist of five questions.
- Four questions will be from four units.
- Fifth question will be from each of the four units having equal weightage.
- Maximum marks of each paper will be 100 i.e. Theory paper 80 Marks and Internal assessment 20 Marks.
- 6. Each paper will be of 3 hours duration.

APPENDIX-III

Grade Point Average (GPA) and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)

 On clearing a paper, based on cumulative score (out of 100) in that paper, a student will be given grade point average (GPA) (Maximum of 10 and minimum of 5) for that paper on the following basis.

- 2) On clearing all the papers in a semester, a student will be allotted a Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) for that particular semester. As the pattern given above does not have differential weighs for papers, the SGPA of a student for a particular semester will be the average of the GPA's for all the papers.
- 3) A student will be allotted a Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) after clearing all the four semesters. Again as there is no differential weight system for semesters, the CGPA of a student will be the average of the four SGPA's of that student.

The CGPA can be converted to the usual / conventional divisions in the following way.

- A student failed to score minimum 50% marks in each head of passing and in aggregate shall be given F grade.
- b. Student with F grade in a course would be granted credit for that course but not the grade for that course.
- Grade points earned in each paper shall be calculated as Grade points obtained (vide above table) x Credits for the paper.
- d. The formula for GPA will be based on Average. The final GPA will not be printed unless a student passes courses equivalent to minimum 100 Credits.
- While declaring the result, the existing relevant ordinances are applicable. For verification and revaluation existing rules will be applicable.
- 6) The candidate may take all the examinations as per the provisions of ATKT simultaneously but his/her result of final semester shall not be declared unless he/she is declared successful at lower examinations.
- 7) If an examinee failed to pass the post graduate programme within five successive years (for four semesters degree) from the date of his / her first admission to particular post graduate programme he/ she shall be declared as "Not Fit for the Course (NFC)" and

he/ she will not be allowed to appear further for any previous examination of the course.

- 8) The final result of students admitted to semester III through lateral admission shall be based on result of III & IV semester together
- 9) The computation of Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) of an examinee shall be given below:
- a. The marks will be given in all examinations which will include the college assessment marks, and the total marks for each Theory/ Practical shall be converted into Grades as per above table. SGPA shall be calculated based on Grade Points corresponding to Grade as given in above table and the credits allotted to respective Theory / Practical shown in the scheme for respective semester.
- b. SGPA shall be computed for every semester and CGPA shall be computed only in IV semester (for four semester degree). The CGPA of IV shall be calculated based on SGPA of all four semesters as per following computation:

Where C1 = Credit of individual Theory / Practical

G1 = Corresponding Grade Point obtained in the Respective Theory/ Practical

Where, (SGPA) I = SGPA of I Semester; (Cr) I = Total Credits for I Semester; (SGPA) II = SGPA of II Semester; (Cr) II = Total Credits for II Semester;

(SGPA) III = SGPA of III Semester; (Cr) III = Total Credits for III Semester; (SGPA) IV = SGPA of IV Semester; (Cr) IV = Total Credits for IV Semester.

APPENDIX -IV

A. Absorption scheme for failure students of the credit based semester pattern:

- a) While switching over to Choice Based Credit System, the failure students of credit based semester pattern will be given Five chances to clear the examination.
- b) The eardidates who have cleared first and second semester of the Credit Based Semester Pattern examination in the concerned subject shall get admission to Third Semester of the Choice Based Credit System directly. However, candidates who are allowed to keep term will not be eligible for admission to Third Semester of the Choice Based Credit System unless they clear all the papers and practical of first and second semester of the Credit Based System Pattern examination as per the clause (a)

B. Absorption scheme for failure students of annual pattern:

The candidates who have cleared first year of annual pattern shall get admission to Semester III of the Choice Based Credit System directly. However, candidates who are allowed to keep term will not be eligible for admission to Third Semester of the Choice Hased Credit System unless they clear all the papers and practical of First year of the annual pattern examination.

C. Absorption Scheme-(CBS TO CBCS)Master of Fashion Design

Special Instructions:

a) A student having passed in a particular subject heads of passing of CBS(Credit Based Semester Pattern) at any semester level shall be exempted from such subject heads of CBCS (Choice Based Credit Semester System). Even if the subject is named with a new nomenclature having similar contents, shall also be exempted and such subject heads are/shall be mentioned in the absorption scheme (as per annexure-A) provided by the respective B.O.S. for relevant semester. In case of absorption, if required, proportionate marks/grades shall be awarded to absorbed subject heads.

to If a new subject head is introduced in the Choice Based Semester Pattern, then the internal marks shall be awarded in proportion to the marks/grades earned by a student in the university/external examination in the same subject head.

d) For [M.Sc. Home Science (Textiles and Clothing) Semester-I]

For adminion to the M.Sc. Home Science (Textile and Clothing) Semester I, B.Sc. (Home Science), Bachelor of Fashion Design, Bachelor of Textile Design of the university, B.Sc. in fashion Technology from Amantalia University or of any other statutory university recognized equivalent thereto.

- 12. Without prejudice to other provisions of Ordinance no. 6 relating to the examination in general, provisions of Para 5, 8, 9, 10, 26, 31 and 32 of the said ordinance shall apply to every student admitted to this course.
- 13. The fees for the tuition, examination, laboratory and other fees shall be as prescribed by the university from time to time.
- 14. The examinee at each of the examination shall have option of not being declared successful at the examination in case he/she does not secure a minimum of 55% marks at the examination. This option will have to be exercised every time the application is



submitted to any of the examinations. Once this option is exercised, the option shall be binding on the examinee and it shall not be revoked under any circumstances.

- 15. The classification of the examinee successful at the semester end examinations and at the end of final semester examination shall be as per the rules and regulations of Choice Based Credit System (semester pattern), as prescribed in Appendix -III, appended with this direction.
- 16. The provisions of Ordinance No. 3 of 2007 for the award of grace marks for passing an examination, securing higher grade in subject(s) as updated from time to time shall apply to the examination under this Direction.
 - 17. All the successful examinees passing all the semester examinations in the minimum prescribed period securing the grades equivalent to first and second division shall be eligible for inclusion of their names in the merit list as provided in ordinance 6 relating to examination in general,
 - 18. The unsuccessful candidate failing to score minimum marks for getting exemption in the course/subject shall be awarded internal/ sessional marks in proportion to the marks secured by the student in the supplementary university examination in the theory part of said course/subject.
 - 19. Examinee successful at the final examination shall on payment of the prescribed fees, will be entitled for the award of the degree of Master of Hospitality Managementin the prescribed form signed by the Vice-Chancellor,
 - 20. This programme is based on Choice Based Credit System the details regarding application of Choice based credit System and formula for conversion of marks in to grades and vice-versa is given in Appendix- III of this direction.
 - 21. If any question of interpretation of any clause of this Direction arises the same shall be referred to the Dean, Faculty of Science and Technology whose opinion shall be final and hinding.
 - 22. Notwithstanding the lapse of Direction No.52 of 2019 all actions taken thereunder till the issuance of this direction shall be valid and binding and be deemed to have been taken in pursuance of the provisions of this Direction. and a

In 1998 the P.G. course was started with the nomenclature Masters in Hospitality Management as per Ordinance No.13 of 1998 and 15 of 2003.

In 2008 the Nomenclature of the P.G. course was converted to Master in Hospitality & Tourism Management as per Ordinance No. 21 of 2009.

In 2013, when the credit based semester system started the nomenclature was changed again to Master in Hotel Management & Catering Technology as per Direction No.11 of 2013. This was done to promote research in the core areas of Hospitality Industry. Now choice based credit system is started with the nomenclature Master of Hospitality Management.

There is a growing need for increasing the "Management" competence in the field of Hotel Management and Catering Technology. Professionally qualified personnel is the need of the day - Personnel who are multi skilled.

The Post Graduate Degree in Hospitality Management aims at bridging the gap and supplying the Hotel Management Industry with Professional Management Candidates who are competent and are able to face the challenges posed by the ever changing Hotel and Hospitality scenario.

"Hospitality" word covers both the areas Tourism and Hotel Management & Catering Technology which gives broader prospects to P.G. students to enter both the areas with knowledge and skill, at any competitive level.

Hence, the nomenclature for the choice based credit system of the Post Graduate course in Hotel Management & Catering Technology should be Master of Hospitality Management.

Project Work Scheme! Guidelines for the Students, Supervisors and Examiners and pattern of question papers etc.

For Semester-III

* Project Design and Planning – Every student is required to design and plan experimental /field based project work on a related research topic of the subject/course. Supervisor will be allotted for guiding students. Each student must present three seminars during the semester on introduction, references, material and methods. Final presentation will be evaluated by external and internal examiners.

For Semester -IV

Every student is required to carry out Experimental / Field Based Project Work (semester IV) on a related research topic of the subject /course. It must be an original work and must indicate some degree of experimental work. The project report shall comprise of Introduction, Review of Literature Material and Methods, Results, Discussion, Summary, Conclusions and References. The project report should be forwarded through Head/Course-coordinator/ Director of the Department /Centre or the Principal of the College.

The supervisors for the Experimental project work shall be from the following Category in order of preference.

A person selected by the duly constituted selection committee in the relevant subject and approved by the University, exclusively for P. G. Course.

OR

A person selected by the duly constituted selection committee of the University approved by the University and appointed as a full time regular teacher with Masters Degree at U. G. Level in the relevant subject and having at least 10 years teaching experience.

OR

A person selected by the duly constituted selection committee of the University approved by the University and appointed as a full time regular teacher with Ph. D. Degree at U.G. Level in the relevant subject and having at least 5 years teaching experience. A person from industry with Degree/three years diptoma in relevant field with 10 years experience at the rank not below manager or with Masters Degree in the relevant field with 5 years experience at the rank not below manager can work as co-supervisor along with supervisor.

OR

A person appointed in PG on contractual / Contributory basis having NET/SET whenever applicable and approved by the University in the relevant subject and having 3 years teaching experience at P.G. level.

OB

University approved Ex Faculty member in the relevant Subject.

Note: The supervisor shall be able to guide not more than 11 (Eleven) students in the given semester examination. The supervisor shall declare in the project of every student which be/she guiding, stating that be/she has not guided more than 11(Eleven) students in the given semester examination.

Pattern of Question Paper

- 1. There will be four units in the syllabus of each paper.
- Question paper will consist of five questions- one question from each unit and the fifth question should include questions from all four units.
 - 3. Maximum marks of each paper will be 100 (80 + 20).
 - 4. All question should have equal weightage
 - 5. Each paper will be of 3 hours duration.

- 2) On clearing all the papers in a semester, a student will be allotted a Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) for that particular semester. As the pattern given above does not have differential weighs for papers, the SGPA of a student for a particular semester will be the average of the GPA's for all the papers.
- A student will be allotted a Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) after clearing all the four semesters. Again as there is no differential weightage system for semesters, the CGPA of a student will be the average of the four SGPA's of that student.

The CGPA can be converted to the usual / conventional divisions in the following way.

- A student failed to score minimum 50% marks in each head of passing and in aggregate shall be given F grade.
- Student with F grade in a course would be granted credit for that course but not the grade for that course.
- Grade points earned in each paper shall be calculated as Grade points obtained (vide above table) x Credits for the paper.
- d. The formula for GPA will be based on Average. The final GPA will not be printed unless a student passes courses equivalent to minimum 100 Credits.
- While declaring the result, the existing relevant ordinances are applicable. For verification and revaluation existing rules will be applicable.
- 6) The candidate may take all the examinations as per the provisions of ATKT simultaneously but his/her result of final semester shall not be declared unless he/she is declared successful at lower examinations.
- 7) If an examinee failed to pass the post graduate programme within five successive years (for four semesters degree) from the date of his / her first admission to particular post graduate programme he/ she shall be declared as "Not Fit for the Course (NFC)" and he/ she will not be allowed to appear further for any previous examination of theprogram.
 - 8) The computation of Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) of an examinee shall be given below:

- a. The marks will be given in all examinations which will include the college assessment marks, and the total marks for each Theory/ Practical shall be converted into Grades as per above table. SGPA shall be calculated based on Grade Points corresponding to Grade as given in above table and the credits allotted to respective Theory / Practical shown in the scheme for respective semester.
- b. SGPA shall be computed for every semester and CGPA shall be computed only in IV semester (for four semester degree). The CGPA of IV shall be calculated based on SGPA of all four semesters as per following computation:

Where C1 = Credit of individual Theory / Practical

G1 = Corresponding Grade Point obtained in the Respective Theory/ Practical

Where, (SGPA) I = SGPA of I Semester; (Cr) I = Total Credits for I Semester;

(SGPA) II = SGPA of II Semester; (Cr) II = Total Credits for II Semester;

(SGPA) III = SGPA of III Semester; (Cr) III = Total Credits for III Semester; (SGPA) IV = SGPA of IV Semester; (Cr) IV = Total Credits for IV Semester.
